## THE WAY WE WERE

[The following might be used to get a discussion going with an older relative, especially for audio taping or video taping.] From: WISCONSIN NOTES, Milwaukee Journal, January 31, 1988. Here's an amusing article which makes an interesting comparison.

1889: Fifty years ago women wore hoop skirts, bustles, petticoats, corsets, cotton stockings, high buttoned shoes, frilled cotton drawers; they did the cleaning, washing, ironing, raised big families, went to church on Sunday and were too busy to be sick.

Men wore wiskers, square hats, Ascot ties, red flannel underwear, big watches and chains; they chopped wood for the stove, bathed once a week, drank 10-cent wiskey and 5-cent beer, rode bicycles, buggies and sleighs, went in for politics, worked 12 hours a day and lived to a ripe old age.

Stores burned coal oil lamps, carried everything from a needle to a plow, trusted in everybody, never took an inventory, placed orders for goods a year in advance, and always made money.

1939: Women wear silk or no stockings, short skirts, no corsets, an ounce of underwear, have bobed hair, smoke paint and powder their faces, drink cocktails, play bridge, drive cars, have pet dogs and go in for politics.

Men have high blood pressure, wear no hats, little hair, shave their whiskers, play golf, bathe twice daily, drink poison, play the stock market, ride in airplanes, never go to bed the same day that they get up, are misunderstood at home, work five hours a day, play ten hours and die young.

Stores have electric lights, cash registers, and elevators, but never what the customer wants, trust nobody, take

inventory daily, never buy in advance, have overhead, mark-up, mark-down, quota, budget, advertising, stock control, annual, semi-annual, and end of the month sales and never make money.

Can you imagine how the author of this piece would describe us now after the next 49 years or almost 50 years? You can hardly believe it yourself.--*The Richland Observer via Out on a Limb, Watertown Genealogical Society, Watertown, Wisconsin, Vol. 4, Issue 4, Nov./Dec. 1989, p. 10.*

To figure a birth date using a calculator, enter:

Death Date	Example:	18890506 for May 6, 1889
Subtract Age	Example:	- 710709 for 71 yrs 7 mo 9da
Subtract 8870, to correct the months and days	Example:	= <u>8870</u>
Total is the Birthdate	Example:	18170927 or September 27, 1817

#### QUAKER DATES

Whenever you find a gravestone which reads: 12th Day of the First Month. This is Society of Friends "Quaker" terminology.

The Quaker religion does not allow them to worship or speak of any pagen gods - 10 months of the calendar are named for pagen gods. As they cannot use the actual month's name, they refer to the month's name as a number. Do not change this number in your files or you will lose this Quaker distinction. [Also you will need to figure out whether January or March is being referred to as the "First Month."] --from *Gems of Genealogy, Bay Area Genealogical Society, Inc., Green Bay, Wisconsin, Vol. XV, No. 5, November-December 1989, p. 2.*

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**HISTORIC HOUSES**

Did you ever wonder what great-grandpa's house was like? There are several ways to find information depending on where they lived. Deeds to property may mention buildings but they are seldom specific. Tax assessment rolls, however, do describe the buildings on each parcel of land. Assessments were updated, then as now, every few years. Although some old assessment rolls may have been lost or discarded, many can be found in Area Research Centers or in town halls. If your ancestors lived in a city, use city directories to determine where the house was--many 100 year old houses are still standing in Wisconsin. You will need to compare directories carefully because street numbering was an inexact science until after 1900.

Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps were drawn to illustrate the risk of fire to any particular building. These maps were drawn every few years and indicate the number of stories, whether wood, brick or stone, etc. These were done nation wide, not just in Wisconsin. Wisconsin maps cover 325 communities, from as early as 1883. Area Research Centers may have copies of the maps for their areas. The State Historical Society has a full set for Wisconsin.

If your family was a prominent businessman or farmer, you may find a photo or drawing of the house in a county history or similar book. Even more likely is a picture of the business. Of course, family members may have photos saved--be sure to ask. Since flash was tricky in the early days of photography, a pose in front of the house is common.--from *Ninnebagoland Roots, Ninnebagoland Genealogical Society, Oshkosh, Wisconsin, Vol. 4, No. 1, Dec. 1989, p. 7.*

**IRISH AND PROUD OF IT**

"Millions of Americans are also citizens of Ireland" according to an article by McCarthy Coyle in the Sep/Oct issue of *Bostonia*. If you can prove that you have at least one grandparent born in Ireland, you are a citizen by Irish law. To formally claim your citizenship you'll need to get a birth or marriage certificate for the ancestor from the General Register Office in Dublin (\$9.00 search fee) and connecting documents in this country. Ask the Irish Consulate nearest you for an application.--from *Ninnebagoland Roots, Ninnebagoland Genealogical Society, Oshkosh, Wisconsin, Vol. 4, No. 1, Dec. 1989, p. 4.*

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**GLASNOST FOR GENEALOGISTS**

The Soviet Embassy has announced that you may now request genealogic research in the USSR. No details are available on price or extent of research which will be done. As with any foreign research, you will need to know the date and location of a birth or marriage to serve as a starting point. The religion ethnic group of your ancestor are also important. This house was built by a newly arrived immigrant from Pomerania, Charles Schulz, in 1856 in Dodge County. He built it like those found in the old country and lived there with his wife and seven children. The Schulz House is now part of the German area of Old World Wisconsin. If you want to search for your family roots, you will find one of these UW-Madison genealogy classes helpful.

## Introduction to Genealogical Research

This class is designed for people interested in learning how to begin genealogical research. It will focus on American research with emphasis on the records of Wisconsin and the eastern states. It will also include the basics for making the jump to European sources. The class covers the basic procedures used in starting research, the proper use of correspondence and some of the resources that are available, such as courthouse and library materials, census records and cemetery information. Participants will meet from 5:30 to 6:50 p.m. for five Wednesdays, January 24 to February 21.

## Genealogy—Advanced

This class is designed to assist the researcher who has progressed beyond the elementary levels of genealogical research. It will concentrate on research techniques, record sources and advanced research problem solving. Although there are some lectures, there will also be ample opportunity for questions and discussion.

Participants will meet from 5:30 to 6:50 p.m. on five Wednesdays, February 28 to March 28.

The instructor for both classes will be James Hansen a reference librarian at the State Historical Society of Wisconsin.

The registration fee is \$23 for each class.

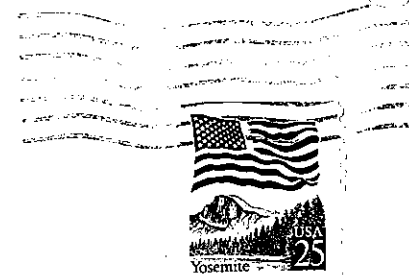
