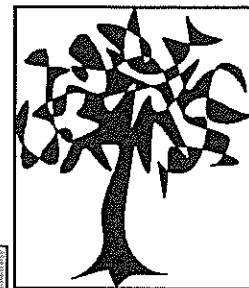

## MANY RESOURCES AT LEIPZIG CENTER

Interest in family history and genealogy, experts say, is booming in Germany today after a long period of comparatively slim interest in the subject. Perhaps no one is feeling the effects of this revival of curiosity more than the staff of the Deutsche Zentralstelle für Genealogie (German Center for Genealogy), in Leipzig (Saxony). Last year, according to the *Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung*, they fielded some 3,000 inquiries from around the world. Some came from lawyers hoping to untangle property claims, many from amateur genealogists seeking help in tracing their ancestry. All were drawn to the Center's unrivaled source materials for research in eastern Germany and the parts of Pomerania, Prussia and Silesia that were once German.

The Center does not undertake genealogical research in response to such queries, but it will help everyone interested in making use of its resources. The list of such resources begins with an extensive library of publications of family history covering the entire German speaking world. Then there is the collection of 100,000 personal documents. Third, the Center began a genealogical card index in 1921 that today provides basic information on 1.4 million people.

Perhaps the most important of the Center's holdings, however, is the collection of 16,000 church registers dating back to the sixteenth century - some originals, some copies and microfilms - that had belonged to the Third Reich's Office of Family Relations (*Reichssippenamt*). Church registers commonly record births, baptisms, marriages and deaths within a particular parish. German clergy first began keeping registers in the sixteenth century, and the practice continued until civil authorities took over responsibility for such matters in the nineteenth century. The registers come from what had once been the eastern provinces of Germany, many parts of what is today western

Germany and parts of other countries occupied by the Third Reich. During the years of the Cold War, westerners often had great difficulty carrying out genealogical research of families from those regions. The Leipzig office, originally founded in 1904, was closed for part of the postwar period and reopened in 1967.

As noted, the Center will not provide you with your family tree, but it can tell you if it might have materials of use for your own genealogical research. The more specific knowledge you have about where in Germany your family came from, the more likely they will be able to help you. Similarly, you stand a better chance of success if you can trace your family back to the period covered by the church registers, i.e. to the early or mid-nineteenth century.

## MORMON GENEALOGICAL [SIC] RESEARCH FACILITY ESTABLISHED IN HESSEN

Friedrichsdorf (Hessen) is a long way from Salt Lake City, but for genealogical researchers the small German town will soon be the next best thing. The town is home to the European center of the Genealogical Society run by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, otherwise known as Mormons. Genealogical research is an important ancillary to Mormon belief, as Peter Zarse, the administrator of the Friedrichsdorf center, told the *Frankfurter Rundschau*. Church members are encouraged to find out as much as possible about their ancestors so that their families can be reunited in the afterlife. Beginning in early 1996, the general public will also be able to seek their ancestors in a modern genealogical research facility being set up at the center. In years of work, Mormon researchers have compiled a data bank with the names of some 60 million individuals, living and dead. Much of the data comes from parish registeries of Christian denominations and was gathered by the cumbersome process of traveling from parish to parish and photographing the registeries. "At the moment there are twelve teams working in Russia" Zarse said. The registeries commonly record births, marriages and deaths, and in some regions in Europe they have been maintained for over four centuries.

The information contained in the Friedrichsdorf data bank is subject to restrictions imposed by the churches owning the registeries as well as the privacy laws of the nations where it was gathered. In some cases, as a result, the records will not give information about a specific individual, but rather an indication where information can be obtained. Nor will information about living individuals be given.

Zarse said he particularly hopes non-Mormon residents of Friedrichsdorf and the region will take advantage of the research center when it

opens its doors next year. "It is our offering to all the citizens of the area," he said.

The 3.5 x 8.5 laminated strip contains the complete German alphabet, both printed and written, in Roman and Old Script; a list of immigration information on 1850-1920 census records; German genealogical symbols; rules and codes for Soundex; basic German genealogical resources; German vocabulary; dates of civil records in German. The strip folds up and fits in a plastic case the size of a business card.

## NEW RESOURCES IN MAGG'S LIBRARY

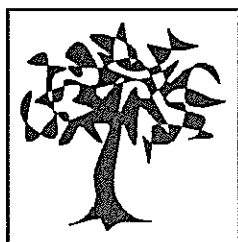
