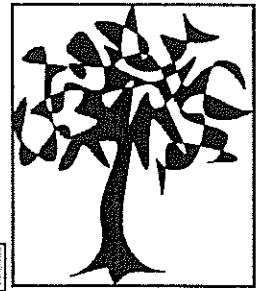

"DEAR ABBY" recently received the following letter from a Florida reader:

"A few years ago my parents made a videotape for their children and grandchildren. It was the most precious Christmas gift I have ever received.

"They told us as much as they could remember about their parents, grandparents and family history. They told about their childhood, youth, meeting and falling inlove. They described their early marriage, their hopes, dreams and plans for their life together. They talked about us children as babies, and related stories that were funny, sad, poignant and informative. They told us of their triumphs and tragedies, dreams fulfilled and forsaken. They repeated family stories that kids hear many times but soon forget.

"There was no attempt to make it a professional tape. They simply borrowed a camcorder, set it up and started to talk. If a horn blew, a dog barked, a phone rang - no one seemed to care. It took them about a week to make the tape. One would talk until he or she was tired, then the other would sit down and carry on. The recorder would be turned off until the next day.

"My parents are both gone now, but I can still hear their voices, see their faces and feel that they are here with me. This gift, which cost only a little time and a lot of love, is my greatest treasure."

Abby's reply: "From your description, I, too, can almost hear them talking. And for those people who are intimidated in front of a camera, or can't seem to get started, a simple question can get the ball rolling: 'Mother, will you please tell me a little about your childhood and your family?'"

CANADIAN OR AMERICAN CITIZENSHIP?

Citizenship might be a problem if you were born on or near the Canadian/American border. The border between the two countries is the result of no less than seven treaties. Negotiators who signed the Treaty of Paris in 1872 relied upon a map drawn 27 years earlier in defining the border. The map's inaccuracies raised boundary questions that were unresolved until 1925.

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CITIZENSHIP ELIGIBILITY

In Wisconsin, it was mandatory to file a Declaration of Intent and Naturalization (Federal Act of 1824) if an immigrant wanted to vote. After December 1, 1908, full naturalization was needed in order to vote. In addition to searching local courts, genealogists may write to the National Archives, Great Lakes Branch, 7358 S. 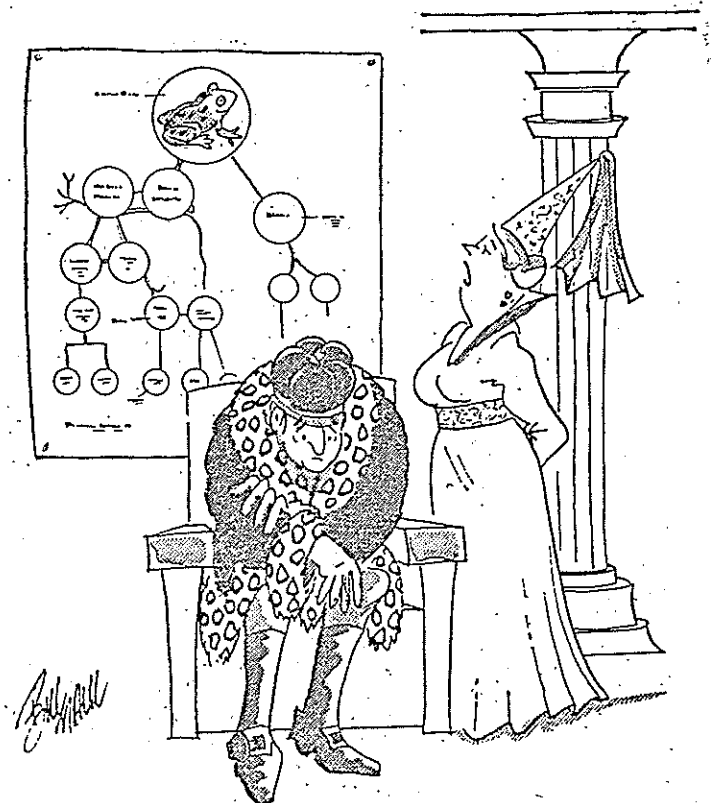

THINGS YOU CAN DO TO HELP KIDS ENJOY FAMILY HISTORY

1. Have a group you belong to such as PTA, sponsor a Culture Fair. Have ethnic dances, music, foods, flags and memorabilia. Have the children prepare a display about their own heritage.
2. In a family or church group you can have children write, direct, make costumes, etc. depicting a historical event.
3. Take children to visit museums where they can discover things their grandparents or great-grandparents used or played with. Check the public library for old catalogs showing advertisements of clothing and household goods.
4. Help your child tape-record an interview with a grandparent (you?). Have the child prepare a few questions such as, "What was your life like during World War II? Did you ever live through an earthquake, tornado or flood?"
5. Help a child embroider or paint a square for a family quilt or wall hanging.
6. Introduce a child to journal writing by providing a loose-leaf note-book. Every time he or she goes some place or has a significant event in their life, have the child draw a picture or take a photograph. Then have them write a few lines describing it. If the child is too young to write he/she can tell a parent who will write it in their words.
7. Make a birthday time capsule box to be opened when they are married.
8. Take vacations to places significant to your family history.
9. Make a Family flag.
10. Paint Family T-shirts
11. Make a word list of genealogy terms and teach children to spell while riding in the car.
12. Make a page with copies of actual signatures for 4-generations.

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ALSACE-LORRAINE RECORDS

A wealthy Frenchman named Andriveau hired scribes to copy all the official records of births, marriages, deaths, divorces, etc. from all cities and districts of Alsace-Lorraine. Later, many of the original records were lost, burned or destroyed. When French officials asked Andriveau to copy his records, he refused. The LDS was allowed to microfilm the records, and they are now available in SLC/FHC but not in Europe.

WHAT TO TAKE ON A WAGON TRAIN

The following article gives us a good picture of how our pioneer ancestors coped with traveling cross country and how they knew what to take.

The following was extracted from pages 499 - 500 of Wayne County Kentucky Marriages and vital Records, Vol. 2. The list was what each person was allowed to take with them in the early wagon train migrations. (CA 1845)

Per Person:

150 lbs. flour or hard bread
 25 lbs. bacon
 10 lbs. rice
 15 lbs. coffee
 2 lbs. tea
 25 lbs. sugar
 1/2 bushel dried peas
 1/2 bushel dried fruit
 2 lbs. soleratus (baking soda)
 10 lbs. salt
 1/2 bushel corn meal
 1/2 bushel corn
 small keg vinegar
 pepper

Clothing per person:

Men: 2 wool shirts
 2 wool undershirts
 Women: 2 wool dresses
 Both: 2 pair drawers
 4 pair wool socks
 2 pair cotton socks
 4 colored handkerchiefs
 1 pair boots and shoes
 poncho
 broad brimmed hat

Bedding per person:

1 canvas
 2 blankets
 1 pillow
 1 tent per family

Miscellaneous per family:

rifle, ball powder
 8-10 gallon keg for water
 1 ax
 1 hatchet
 1 spade
 2 or 3 augers
 1 hand saw
 1 whip or cross-cut saw
 1 plow mold
 at least 2 ropes
 mallet for driving picket pins
 matches carried in bottles & corked

Sewing Supplies:

(placed in buckskin or stout cloth bag)
 stout linen thread
 large needles, thimble
 bit of bee's wax
 few buttons
 buckskin for patching
 paper or pins

Personal Items:

1 comb and brush
 2 toothbrushes
 1 lb. castile soap
 1 belt knife
 1 flint stone per man

Cooking:

Baking pan - used for baking and for roasting coffee; mess pan - wrought iron or tin; 2 churns - one for sweet, one for sour milk; 1 coffee pot — tin cup with handle, 1 tin plate, knives; 1 coffee mill (forks, spoons per person); 1 camp kettle, fry pan, and wooden bucket for water.

Medical Supplies:

Iron rust, rum and cognac (both for dysentery), calomel, quinine for ague, Epsom salts for fever, castor oil capsules.

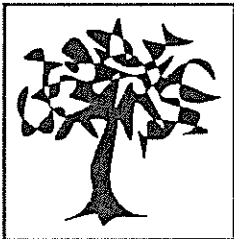
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**ATTRIBUTES OF A
