## MEETING REVIEWS

At our March meeting, Robert Archibald, of the Church of Latter Day Saints, Marshfield, presented an interesting and informative talk on the involvement of the LDS church with genealogical record preservation.

His presentation went beyond a historical sketch of the LDS church. It included detailed descriptions of the church's methods of safeguarding the world's vital records, original manuscripts, histories, biographies and other genealogical records.

After providing us with a little background, he went on to explain that the LDS Genealogical Society library holdings can be used by all of us through inter-library loan at the branch genealogical libraries. The nearest LDS branch libraries are located at Shawano and Eau Claire.

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Karen Boorboom presented an equally interesting program on the use of census records at our April Meeting. In her talk, she highlighted the history of the Census records, and explained how, from the first U.S. Federal Census in 1790 to the current census records; the amount and kind of information useful to genealogists improved.

Karen also instructed us on the use of the Soundex System when searching for our ancestors. She explained how the soundex can help the researcher locate ancestors even when the exact residence is unknown.

She also mentioned some of the special census schedules available, including the Mortality and Agriculture schedules.

After presenting a variety of information on census records, Karen allowed members time to work with the Soundex records she recently acquired.

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## Microfilmed Census Records

As we all learned at our April meeting, Karen Boerboom has recently purchased the 1880 Soundex for the state of Wisconsin. She has also ordered the 1880, and 1900 Federal Census records for Wood County, the 1905 State Census for Wood County and the 1900 Federal Census for Marathon County.

She has graciously offered to make these records available to our members. In return for use of the films, she is asking a donation of 50 cents per film used. For non-members of the Marshfield Group, she is asking \$1 per film. These donations will be placed in the group's treasury.

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## SURNAME INDEX AND NEWSLETTER INDEX

The Surname Index of the Marshfield Area Genealogy Group is nearly completed. It should be available at the June Meeting.

Also available at the June meeting will be an index to the first volume of our newsletter. It contained a surprising 626 names which should make it a valuable aid to researchers of the Marshfield Area.

## SELF-ADDRESSED STAMPED ENVELOPE

It is customary when making genealogical inquiries, to include a SASE (Stamped, self-addressed envelope). Val Greenwood writes in his book, *The Researcher's Guide to American Genealogy*, page 89, "When you write to a federal agency or to a state agency it is not necessary to provide for postage, but letters addressed to officials of counties or towns or to newspapers, historical societies, church officials, etc. within the U.S., should include a stamped envelope addressed back to you. The only exception to this would be when you allow money for postage in your remittance or when you are paying a set fee for a service."

As a general rule, if you're in doubt about including a SASE, include it. It is a small investment, and the return could be invaluable.

## KITH AND KIN

One of the items discussed at the March 28th Board Meeting was the name of our Newsletter. There were several possible names suggested, but *Kith and Kin*, was selected.

It seems an appropriate name for our genealogy group's newsletter. Meaning friends and relatives, it hits at the heart of the group's primary purpose. A group of friends helping each other in their research of relatives.

Although we've changed the name of our newsletter, the primary aim of the newsletter has not changed. Future issues of *Kith and Kin*, will continue to keep you informed about group news, current events in genealogy, research methods and queries.

### NATURALIZATION PROCESS

Few women entries are found in Naturalization records because from 1855 until the passage of the Married Women's Act in 1922, (*Cable Act of 1922*) citizenship was automatically confirmed on the wife of any male citizen. Since then, women have been required to be naturalized in their own right.

Particularly in the 19th century, many more people filed the Declaration of Intention (*first papers*) than filed a Petition for Naturalization. In Wisconsin, this may be because the State Constitution granted the right to vote to anyone who filed a Declaration of Intention. On December 1, 1908, the Constitution was ammended to require full citizenship in order to vote.

Other documents are sometimes found with naturalization records held by county clerks of court. There may be denial of citizenship; Change of name was often made offical at time of naturalization by order of the court; Oath of Allegience or Repatriation record; Transfer of Petitions; Certificate of Loyalty. *from the Fox Valley Genealogical Society Newsletter, Genealogical Gems*

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### WISCONSIN STATE GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY PIONEER FAMILY OR CENTURY FAMILY CERTIFICATES

The Wisconsin State Genealogical Society is presently accepting applications for two certificates.

The first, a Pioneer Family Certificate, will be presented to any applicant who directly descends from an ancestor who settled in Wisconsin prior to 1850. The second, a Century Family Certificate is available for anyone who directly descends from an ancestor who settled in Wisconsin 100 or more years ago.

For both certificates, the applicant must be able to prove descent from the ancestor by an official record, but the applicant need not presently live in Wisconsin. Proof furnished will be verified by WSGS personnel from referenced data and records before a certificate is issued.

**INVENTORY OF NEW YORK  
MANUSCRIPTS AVAILABLE**

A breakthrough in New York State research is being made with the publication of a series of county guides which are the result of a comprehensive manuscript inventory project now underway. The following explanation is quoted in part from a brochure recently issued by the New York Historical Resources Center at Cornell University:

"If you have ever attempted to investigate some aspects of New York local history, you know that frustration is all too frequent. You feel certain that the documents you seek must have been saved by someone, somewhere, but they are not in one of the logical places, and no one can tell you where they are or even if they still exist.

Now the New York Historical Resources Center (NYHRC) is filling that void with a manuscript survey. County by county, its field workers comb each village and town, preparing a comprehensive inventory of all historical documents and archives, accessible to the public. In the process, they have located over twice as many archives than had been listed in the past. To date, these searchers have examined over ten thousand collections of historical documents, maps, manuscripts, and other archival materials. They are not finished yet.

A number of the guides are already finished and the remainder of the 62 counties, including New York city, are expected to be completed within the next five years."

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## MAP COLLECTION AT UW-MILWAUKEE'S GOLDA MEIR LIBRARY

The entire American Geographical Society collection of maps, worth at least \$30 million, was moved to Milwaukee in 1978 after the society decided it could no longer afford to keep it in New York City. The collection consists of almost 400,000 maps, 5,500 atlases, 45,000 photos and 180,000 volumes of geographic works. Anyone doing research on geographical topics is welcome to use the library. ### GERMAN LINEAGE BOOK

*The Deutsches Geschlechterbuch* (German lineage book) is the largest series of collected genealogies in Germany. It was first published in 1889 and is now in 190 volumes, many devoted to specific German states and others dealing with families from all over Germany. Some link up with families in America. The first 110 volumes are in old style German script and are more difficult to read (whole series in German). For each family there is a brief history with discussion of origin of name, a coat of arms if appropriate, places where family lived, and complete genealogy. Pictures are scattered throughout. Each volume is indexed by surname in the back, and there is a cumulative index to the first 150 volumes that refers to volume number of the desired surname. There is also an index to names of noble descent (genealogies in the first 42 volumes). Genealogies are well done and volumes are valuable for researchers tracing Germanic lineages. "East" Germany is an offensive phrase. Correctly it is the D.D.R (Deutsches Democratic Republic). Write: Zentralstelle fur Genealogie in der DDR, Georgi-Dimitroff Platz, 1 DDR-7010 Leipzig.

The first request should be no longer than four sentences in English, with surnames done in CAPITAL LETTERS. You will receive only typed or handwritten copies

of requested documents. *Do not send money*--instead use 3 International Postal Reply Coupons. *Do not include a SASE.* You will be billed, usually a reasonable amount. You then return an international bank draft.--from *The Manitowoc County Genealogical Society Newsletter*

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### POLISH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY ESTABLISHES ANCESTOR INDEX FILE

The Polish Genealogical Society has established an Ancestor Index Card File at the Polish Museum of America. Members and non-members may submit 3x5 cards on their earliest ancestors as follows: 1) Last name, first name, and initial, 2) Date and place of birth, 3) Date and place of death, 4) Name of spouse, 5) List children on back of card, and 6) Your name and address.

## NEWS FROM THE STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF WISCONSIN

Major acquisitions of U.S. and Canadian census records and immigrant passenger lists have made the Society's library even more popular for genealogical and local history research. Almost 6,000 reels of microfilmed lists were added in little more than a year.

The holdings now include all of the U.S. Censuses from 1790 thru 1910, the Canadian censuses for 1851, 1861, 1871 and 1881, and the Atlantic and Gulf port U.S. immigrant passenger lists for the 19th century, plus those for Quebec. Many Wisconsin immigrants arrived via Canadian ports.

To date the society has not been able to acquire all the available indexes or soundexes for the U.S. census, but it has all the current indexes for passenger lists.

The U.S. censuses for Wisconsin are available for interlibrary loan for all years except 1910, since the library has duplicate copies of them. The library also will lend the microfilmed indexes for Wisconsin through 1870.

As for the Passenger lists, the principal ports represented are Philadelphia, Boston, Baltimore, New York, and New Orleans, together with all available indexes for the years 1847-1896. No index exists for Quebec or New York ports.
