

## 1895 ASSESSMENT ROLLS - MARSHFIELD, WISCONSIN

Starting with this issue and continuing in following issues of Kith and Kin, the Personal Property Assessment Rolls of the residents of the city of Marshfield will be featured. Not only will the resident's name appear, but also a listing of property and values as determined by the City Assessor in 1895. This is a unique find. The rolls from 100 years ago, can give clues to personal possessions that may have been handed down from generation to generation, such as, a family watch. These records, as well as other tax records may be used in your Genealogical Research to prove an ancestor's residence in a community at a particular time. Personal Property lists are especially important since they quite often list persons established in the community but who own no land.

This is not the first time Assessment Rolls have appeared in *Kith and Kin*. The 1890 Assessment Rolls appeared, starting with the March/April 1987, Vol. 3, #6 issue of *Kith and Kin* and ran in five consecutive issues through the November/December 1987, Vol. 4, #4 issue.

Another Assessment Roll which ran in Kith and Kin included the rolls for the Village of Auburndale, Wood County, WI for 1890. They ran in two consecutive issues starting with the January/February 1988, Vol. 4, No. 5 and ended with the March/April 1988, Vol. 4, No. 6 issue. They are also available at a cost of \$1.00 per back-issue (\$2.00 for both issues, plus \$1.00 shipping/postage for a total of \$3.00. ### USING SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS IN GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH

Social Security was enacted in 1935 and the numbers were issued beginning in 1937.

Using the Social Security Death Index available on the computer at the Family History Center, you can obtain a deceased relative's social security number. Request a copy of the deceased person's SS 5 (citizen's application for a social security number card) by sending the individual's full name, social security number; and, a \$7.00 check made payable to the Social Security Administration to the Freedom of Information Officer, 4-H-8 Annex Building, 6401 Security Boulevard, Baltimore, MD 21235. (The cost is \$16.50 if you don't know the number.)

The SS 5 will provide: full name of applicant, place of residence at time of application, name and address of employer, date and place of birth, father's full name, mother's full maiden name, date of application for the card, and handwriting sample (signature).

You can interpret the number yourself to determine where your relative lived. The first three digits are the area number, the next two digits are the group number, and the final four digits are the serial number. Only serial numbers are assigned on a first come served basis, except 2000 and 7000 series, which are given to every fifth person to create a random sample.

Until 1972 area location numbers indicated location of Social Security Office that issued the Social Security Number (SSN). Since 1972, the SSN's have been issued centrally and the area code represents the person's state of residence as shown on the SSN application. Before 1964 railroad workers had an separate "area code"...700-729.

### OCTOBER IS FAMILY HISTORY MONTH

### WRITING COURSE BEING OFFERED ON U.W. CAMPUS

Brian McCombie, an instructor with the University of Wisconsin - Marshfield Campus, will be offering courses on writing your family and business histories in conjunction with the Marshfield History Project.

The courses, one on writing your family history and one on writing your business history will begin January 30, 1996 and then run the 2nd Tuesday of each month through October. The Family History sessions will run starting with the January class and repeat in March, May, July, and September. The Business History sessions will start with the February class and repeat during the months of April, June, August, and October.

The class starts each night at 7:00 p.m. and lasts for about 2 hours (9:00 p.m.). During the 1st hour, Brian will cover the requirements of the class, go through the format and steps to follow when writing your story. In the 2nd hour, the class will get some hands on experience in learning how to edit without eliminating vital information.

Cost of each class will be \$8.00. Information on registration will be following in the next issue of *Kith and Kin*.

# FAMILY HISTORY BEGINS WITH ME: WRITING MY OWN LIFE STORY

We all need a little prodding from time to time to get us going on a project. The following is intended to get you started on organizing your family materials into something a little more workable. If you can keep up with the monthly assignments, the overall project seems alot more bearable.

### Monthly Assignments

January - Your birth; facts, stories you've heard, how your older brother reacted to you

February - Your parents, grandparents and other memorable relatives: facts, descriptions, skills, and hobbies, stories, jokes, songs, recipes, interview them if possible

March - Your preschool years: friends, favorite games and toys, favorite books or stories, memories, funny words and sayings, your understanding of events or early impressions

April - Elementary or Grammar School: friends, teachers, first memories of learning, pets, relatives, music/art, class trips, gym and recess, favorite/worst subjects, religious school

May - Your teen years, high school, teachers, classes, favorite/worst subject, dreams and goals, sports, activities, clubs, community and religious activities, beliefs, memorable learning experience

June - Young adult years: further education (college or vocational school), first job(s), dates and first love(s), friends, relatives, politics (first vote), driving, music, dancing, holidays, activities

July - Marriage: how you met, first impressions, the proposal, shared goals and dreams, wedding, jobs, friends, activities, families, celebrating holidays together, entertaining, music, reading, films, religion, politics, impact of world or national events, pets, births of children

August - Career: how you decided on it or how it "picked" you, first salary, boss, actual work you did, goals, co-workers, vacations, union or association memberships, community, activities

September - Middle years: work, activities, hobbies, friends, children, relatives, early losses (of relatives, friends, jobs), successes, overcoming setbacks and loss, health (family health history)

October - Later years: retirement, interests, hobbies, activities, secod career, rewards, property (homes, cottages), describe and map homes, travel, major events

November - Ideas, rules to live by or wosdom you'd like to pass on to future generations, items or stories that didn't fit above, Decide on style and size of your finished product. Photos?

December - Edit, organize, add photos and maps, type or print, make covers, bind

# Marshfield History Book To Be Compiled and Published

A book about Marshfield and its people is being compiled and published through the efforts of the Marshfield History Project. The book's purpose is to preserve the heritage of our community, and of all families who live or have lived in Marshfield. Publication and distribution are planned for June 1997 to mark the city's 125th anniversary.

This unique book about Marshfield will feature three sections - a local history narrative, a collection of business and organizational histories, and a collection of family stories. In addition, the book will have a cross-reference index.

The local history narrative will chronologically examine events which shaped Marshfield, and will review our community's contributions to, and participation in, state, national and international events.

The business or organizational history section will include both past and current Marshfield organizations, including Marshfield businesses, schools, churches, clubs and organizations.

The family history section will preserve personal stories about Marshfield's people. Anyone

whose family is connected to Marshfield is invited to write and submit their family stories. These stories will be written by members or friends of each family and may include a family photo. Family stories are limited to 500 words each. There is no charge for including them in this text.

Hundreds of photos, illustrations and maps, many never before published, will be included to document the history of our community. Project organizers anticipate the book will be 350-400 pages, printed on quality paper to last for many years, ensuring that the book can be kept and treasured.

### Early Bird's-Eye Views of City; Limited Edition Reprint

Limited edition reprints of the 1883 and 1891 bird's-eye views of the city of Marshfield will be for sale August 30.

Bird's-eye views were produced during the mid-19th century by traveling artists who would walk up and down a city's streets and sketch each building. They would then select an aerial vantage point and create a composite picture of the city as if they were looking down on it from above. When the sketch was completed, it was transferred to a lithograph stone, printed and published in limited quantities. There are few known originals of the Marshfield views.

# Write Your Family's Story For the Marshfield History Book

Your family's story is important and you can tell it best. As part of the Marshfield History Project, residents - old and new - are invited to submit stories about their families for inclusion in the history book. This is your opportunity to create a unique legacy for yourself, your family, neighbors and friends, a chance to "tell your story" for posterity.

The focus of these stories should be your family. You might begin with the background of family members before they settled in this community. Or focus on some significant episode of your life, or your ancestors, that you'd like to share. As you tell your story, please use complete names of family members and be as specific about significant dates as possible. Besides writing about when and where people were born, married or died, you could include some of the family's "favorite stories." These might be stories that you heard told by your parents or grandparents as you were growing up. We all have these types of stories in our families. They could be related to major events like the World Wars, or sometimes they're stories about everyday life. In either case, you could tell these stories in your own words, saving them for generations to come.

There is no right or wrong way for you to tell your story, but here are a few guidelines which project coordinators have outlined. Stories should be typewritten, double-spaced on 8½"X 11" paper; one to two pages in length, or up to 500 words. On each of these pages, include your name, address and a story title in the upper right-hand corner.

You may also include a family photograph with each story. These should be clearly identified with your name, address and phone number on the back. Also, identify each person in the photo using full names whenever possible. If possible please note when, where and why the photograph was taken. Your photographs will be handled carefully and returned to you after the book is completed.

We anticipate receiving many family stories so please call and reserve your space for as many stories as you would like to write. Stories will be accepted on a first come, first accepted basis.
