JUNE DAIRY FEST MALL DISPLAY

Our 1985 June Dairy Fest Display was a huge success, with many Dairyfest visitors stopping by to learn how to research their family history. Drawing a great deal of attention and use was the Wisconsin 1880 census records. Often one, two or three people were waiting to see if they could locate their ancestors among these records. Also attracting interest was the collection of early agricultural artifacts displayed. They prompted many stories, and just as many questions, about our early dairy heritage.

Just as the visitors to the booth seemed to enjoy the time spent with us, so did members of the group who turned out to help. 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MEETING REVIEWS

Following our Annual Business Meeting in May, Joann Hilgemann shared her trip to Germany by means of a slide presentation. Her enjoyable and interesting talk gave us all a better insight into the people, architecture, and scenery of Germany.

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Don Schnitzler and Deanne Reyer presented a program around genealogical research trips at the June meeting.

Schnitz discussed the necessary steps to be taken for preparing for a trip. He presented two keys

for successsful research trips. organization and self-confidence. Schnitz stressed that most of the work that goes into a successful research trip should be done before you ever leave home. He recommended that as part of the preparations, you write down in advance, everything that you want to search for. Then using your notes you can make the most of your research time. DON'T TRUST YOUR MEMORY. He concluded saying, be confident, "Go prepared for a good and successful trip, no matter what happens."

Deanne's portion of the program centered on the Newberry Library at Chicago. This large library is an excellent resource for family historians because of its extensive collection of printed genealogical and historical material. Deanne first outlined the beginnings of the Library and then explained how they have gone about collecting materials over the years. She highlighted some of the holdings of specific interest genealogist. One particular holding, the Newberry Genealogical Index, was talked about in detail. Deanne's talk went on to include a discussion of the policies that must be used by patrons of the library.

GENEALOGY INFORMATION EXCHANGE

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS PHOTODUPLICATION

One of the greatest sources of photographs of the civil war or of famous people, or important people or important events in American History is the Library Congress. Tens of thousands of negatives have been catalogued for the public. Prints in 8-by-10 or larger are available (not always from the original negative) for a few dollars. AMERICAN FRENCH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

The American-French Genealogical Society (AFGS) is one of the largest French-Canadian genealogical organizations in New England. In addition to having one of the most complete French-Canadian genealogical libraries in the United States, they have the Loiselle Index of French-Canadian Marriages, the Rivest Files, both which represent over two million marriages on microfilm; and the Forget Marriages of Rhode Island.

PROBATE PACKET

When writing to a courthouse for information about a will, ask for a 'Probate Packet" instead of a will. You may find what you are seeking because sometimes an individual died without leaving a will, but did leave property that went through probate.—from the Central Montana Genealogical Society Newsletter, Wagon Trails

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BOOK OF MAPS

A book of maps is called an atlas because the 16th century Flemish geographer Gerardus Mercator's book of maps detailing various portions of Europe sported on its cover a picture of the Greek titan Atlas holding the world on his shoulders. Thus this book became known as the atlas.

Early Wood County Probate Records are available for use on Microfiche at the Wood County Court House. The Clerk of Probate controls their use and can direct you to the correct procedures.

Each microfiche may contain as many as 100 pages of copy. The cost for each page copied is \$1, payable to the Clerk of Probate.—

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NEW ENGLAND HISTORIC GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

The New England Historic Genealogical Society, founded in 1845 is dedicated to collecting, studying and preserving the history of New England families and communities. Their library collection, the largest in New England, contains nearly 400,000 volumes of the most significant genealogical and local history material available in print today. Family and town histories, city directories, eference works, rare books and microforms are all part of their open stack collection.

You do not have to live in New England to enjoy the NEHGS. As a member you can utilize their book loan mail service for research in your home. The circulating library has a collection of more than ten thousand volumes in the main library. Members may borrow up to three books at a time for three weeks use. A multi-volume catalog gives members an up-to-date bibliography of this collection.

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ILLINOIS REGIONAL ARCHIVES DEPOSITORY

The Illinois Regional Archives Depository system (ĪRAD) provides room at specified sites for the preservation of records when storage space in courthouses and other offices has become problem. Designated depositories in Illinois are: Eastern Illinois University at Charleston, Northern University at DeKalb, Illinois State University at Normal, Sangamon State University Springfield, Southern Illinois University at Carbondale and Western Illinois University at Macomb. IRAD installation has inventory of what is deposited at that library as well as a computer listing of holdings at the other five regions.

To find what is available on any given Illinois county, one may phone, write or go in person to any of the depositories and the staff will assist you in locating the desired county records.

OBTAINING NEW JERSEY WILLS

Photocopies of New Jersey wills, from the 1600's through 1901, can be obtained from the New Jersey Bureau of Archives. When requesting photocopies, send all sp∉cifics you know to identify the subject name, date of death or probate, case number, county, etc. to: Archives Section, CN307, 185 W. State, Trenton, NJ 052**65.** When information located, you will be sent a billing slip, and upon receipt of payment, they will send your copies. Wills dating earlier than 1817 will be copied from microfilm, not from original documents.

The Genealogy Division of the New Jersey State Library can provide copies of abstracts only from wills for years of about 1600 to 1817. Their ordering and billing procedure is the same as with the Archives Section. Wills dated after 1901 are filed with the approriate Superior Court. — from the Tri-State Trader Genealogy Section

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WISCONSIN STATE OLD CEMETERY SOCIETY

The Wisconsin State Old Cemetery Society was incorporated in 1971 as an affiliate of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin. Its aims are to encourage the restoration, maintenance and preservation of all old, abandoned and/or neglected cemeteries and burial sites throughout the state.

The WSOCS also publishes a quarterly newsletter, Inscriptions, which keeps their members informed f individual group activities as well as giving notices of all meetings of the Society.

One of the major accomplishments of the WSOCS, of great interest to genealogist, is the project of their Archivist. He maintains 3 x 5 file index of all located cemeteries in the State with a corresponding surname card index showing in which cemetery these surnames appear.

Membership in the society is widespread, with members from most counties in Wisconsin as well as from at least 40 States. Annual membership dues are \$6.
