
# GERMAN GENEALOGICAL INDEX

What is the German Genealogical Index? It is a project to enable genealogists and local historians researching others same surnames and/or localities in all areas  $\circ f$ German-speaking Because genealogical Europe. historical research can be timeconsuming as well as costly, it is imperative that the researcher be aware of other individuals who are interested in the same surnames and/or localities. Ву pooling resources and sharing data the researcher is able to benefit from experience of others, avoiding duplication of effort and expense.

All data received for the Index is indexed by both surname and locality. This enables the researcher to quickly determine who is interested in a specific sur-

name, village, district, province, etc. Remember that researchers interested in the same village or district may be able to offer you data from published histories, or may be able to guide you in your research in that particular area. Thus, the locality index can be as important as the surname index.

Another important function of index is to preserve valuable genealogical data which otherwise miaht published. not be Americans have genealogical gleaned from German documents brought to the United States by their immigrant ancestors. Baptismal, confirmation, and marriage certificates, military certificates, family Bibles, etc. offer a wealth of useful information. especially if they list village of origin across the Atlantic. It is precisely the type of data which can be published and preserved in the German Genealog-( ical Index. (cont. next page)



The general locality refers to the country, German state, province, principality, etc. in which a specific village, town or city is located. The Index contains data on surnames and localities in East and West Germany, Switzerland, Austria, Luxembourg and the Netherlands, as well as former German settlements in eastern and southeastern Europe (Poland, Hungary, Czechoslavakia, etc.).

The specific locality is the village, town, or city in which a surname is found. The "Kreis" (district) is very important because it helps to differentiate between villages of the same name in various provinces.

Participation in the German Genealogical Index is open, free of charge, to anyone who has data for the index. This nationwide project involves individuals from a wide variety of genealogical and historical societies throughout the United States. 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### BOHEMIAN RESEARCH

The Czechoslovak government.under Russian Rule, more or less discourages searches in Czechoslovak Archives, except bу citizens living in the country. The government prefers this procedure: Contact your nearest Czech Embassy for them to conduct a search for a fee. But--fees can go quite high, and no pre-search estimate is given. You would need to give name of the person whose ancestry is being searched, place of birth, marriage, and death (with dates), and name of parents if known as well as religion. The

cost of a "running account"—
tracing several generations—is
based on time spent. Some lines
can be traced, and in other cases
no records seem to exist. It
takes several months for a report,
and a deposit of at least \$30 is
required for such a search.

Such requests for limited to one per year without charge; additional requests should be accompanied by a donation to the society. A search includes a check of the files bу archivist and a search by the county coordinator. Requests must be limited to two burials at any one time; a SASE must be included with these requests.

The society's newsletter, Inscriptions, is published quarterly and includes articles on the restoration and preservation of old cemeteries, queries by members, reports of activites and notices of future meetings.

#### CHURCH RECORDS IN WISCONSIN

Church Records in Wisconsin may be found in a variety of local-ities.

The religious denominations most encountered in research are Catholic and Lutheran. Catholic records are still most often found either in the custody of the original parish or at the diocesan headquarters. Lutheran church records may also be found at the individual congregation level or in many cases at the appropriate Synod archives: for the Misourri) Synod, Concordia Historical Institute, 801 DeMun Ave., St. Louis, Missouri 63105; for the ALCA, The American Lutheran Church Archives, Wartburg Theological Seminary, Dubuque, Iowa 52001; and for the Wisconsin Synod, the Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary Library, 6633 West Wartburg Circle, 117 N., Mequon, Wisconsin 53092. The State Historical Society's Archives has acquired microfilms of a variety of church records, including many Methodist, Baptist, Congregational, Lutheran and other denominations, but many more can still be found elsewhere.--from the State Trader, Genealogy Section, article on Wisconsin Research Opportunities by James Hansen.

Alberta--Complete records from 1878. Some births from 1853. Some deaths from 1893. Fee: Address: Division of Vital Statistics, Dept. of Social Services & Community Health, Texaco Bldg. /Main Floor, 10130--112 St., Edmonton, AB, T5K 2K4. Note: New application forms SSCH 1564 18A are to be used.

British Columbia——Although civil registration officially began in 1872, early records are incomplete. Some baptism records date back to 1849. Fee: \$10. Address: Divistion of Vital Statistics, Ministry of Health, Parliament Bldgs., Victoria, BC V8V 1X4.

Manitoba—Civil Registration began 1882 but incomplete until 1920. Church reords (incomplete) will be searched when denomination known. Fee: birth, marriage & death certificates \$8; Genealogical Searches \$15; Disinterments (includes copy of death) \$28. Address: Office of Vital Statistics, Dept. of Health & Community Services, Room #104/Norquay Bldg., 401 York Ave., Winnipeg, MB R3C OP8.

NEWFOUNDLAND—Civil Registration began in 1892. Records in custody of the Registrar of Vital Statis tics. Fee \$4. Address: Registrar of Vital Statistics, Dept. of Health, Confederation Bldg., St. John's, NF A1C 5T7.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES—The records are complete from 1925. Fee \$2. Address: Registrar of Vital Statistics, P.O. Box 1320, Yellowknife, NT X1A 2L9.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND—Civil Registration began 1906 but some marriage records go to 1783. Fee: \$5. Address: Director of Vital Statistics, Dept. of Health, P.O. Box 3000, Charlottetown, PE C1A 7P1.—from the Tri-State Trader Generalogy Section.

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#### YEOMAN DEFINED

"Yeoman" is a term carried over from the colonial days and usually meant the person was a free holder, or one who owned small landed property.

Upon closer examination of the property, three grave markers have been found as well as several bases. The three marked graves are of:


Jacob J. Schmid	Ferdinand Carlson	William Speicher
