ASSEMBLY BILL 427

The Wisconsin Assembly on Tuesday February 26th passed Assembly Bill 427, on March 25th the Senate also passed it.

Assembly bill 427 should simplify the recording methods of vital statistics in Wisconsin. It appears to basically provide for a state wide computer system for registration of birth, death and marriages. The original copy and duplicated microfilm copies will be kept at Madison — one in the state registrar's office and the second in permanent storage for historical preservation. Computer accessible records will also be available locally.

Indexes of names, dates, sexes, places of birth, and parents names will be available in alphabetical order by blocks of years, hopefully making research easier.

After addressing concerns of genealogists and others the State Genealogical Society supported the bill.

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN STEVENS POINT AREA RECEARCH CENTER

The Stevens Point Area Recearch Center(ARC) is administered by the Library of the UW-SP. The Center's permanent holdings of archives and manuscripts include the records and papers of a variety of individuals, organizations businesses and local governments in a twelve county region of central and northern Wisconsin. These counties are: Ad≃me. For⇔st. Juneau, Langlade, Lincoln, Marathon, Oneida, Portage, Vilas, Waupaca, Waushara and Wood.

Among items of interest to family history researchers are: Pre-1907 indexes to Wisconsin Vital Records, Census records, Naturalization records, and local tax records.

The Archives is open daily, Monday through Friday, 8-12 and 1-4:30. The Documents room is open daily, Monday through Friday, 8-4:30.

MARATHON COUNTY CEMETERY INDEX

The Marathon County Genealogical Society has announced it publicat-

ion of an Every Name Index to the Marathon County Cemetery Inscript— ions. The Inscriptions, bound into eight volumes include 102 Marathon County cemeteries and 30 cemeteries within 3 miles of the Marathon County line in neighboring counties.

The Index, including 67,000 surnames, immediately gives you a list of all persons of each surname (or variation) as well as given name. It tells you in which cemetery each or these persons are buried and in what volume and page the inscription of tombstone can be found.

Copies of Marathon County Cemetery Inscriptions can be found at the Marathon County Public Library at Wausau and the State Historical Society of Wisconsin, Madison.

The Index volume is soft cover, 320 pages, 8 1/2 X 11, price \$10 including sales tax and mailing costs. It is available through the Marathon County Genealogical Society, P.O. Box 1512, Wausau, WI 54401.

LITHUANIA RESEARCH SITES

Several institutions in the U.S. can help in researching Lith-uanian roots.

The University of Pennsylvania, 3420 Walnut, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania 19104 has 4,000 volumes on the history of Lithuania.

The University of Kansas, Spenser Research Library, Lawrence, Kansas 66045 has medieval history.

Balzekas Museum of Lithuanian Culture, 4012 Archer Ave., Chicago, Illinois 60632 is the largest Lithuanian resource and research center outside of Lithuania. In addition to the more than 20,000 volumes and 500 rare books, the museum library has a card file of 1900-1979 death notices in Lithuanian newspapers.—from the Tri-State Trader, Genealogy Section.

LOCATING GERMAN PLACE NAMES

For locating German place names the following is highly recommended. Meyers, Orts-Und Derkehr-Lexikon des Deutschen Reichs(three volumes) Leipzig und Wien, 1912. On microfilm at the Genealogical Society of Utah and its branch libraries the film numbers are: F-496,640 (place names A-K), F-496,641 (L-Z).

SOCIAL SECURITY RECORDS AS A GENEALOGICAL SOURCE

Records held by the Social Security Administration may provide information on your deceased direct ancestors not available elsewhere. Because applicants for social security needed documentation of their birth to prove their age, these records are invaluable. If your ancestor lived past 1935, chances are good you may find a social security file in his them rade.

If you would like information from the Social Security Administration, either an application for a number or a claim for benefits, you must provide the deceased persons Social Security number or identifying information and a copy of the death certificate. You should also briefly explain what information you need and that it is not available anywhere else. Responses take about three months.

PENNSYLVANIA VITAL RECORDS

The Pennsylvania Vital Records System requires the payment of a \$4 fee for each certified copy of birth certificates and a \$3 fee for each certified copy of death certificates. The fee must be paid before a certificate can be prepared and mailed to you. The address is: Pennsylvania Department of Health, Division of Vital Records, P.O. Box 1528, New Castle, PA 16103.

REGIONAL ARCHIVES-CHICAGO

The Federal Archives, Chicago Branch, 7358 S. Pulaski Avenue, Chicago, IL 60629, is open for research by reservation only. The center contains all extant census returns for the United States through 1910; Soundex for 1880 and 1900, 1910 for 21 states only; Index and Revolutionary War Rolls; Internal Revenue Assessment Lists for Illinois 1862-66; Indian Census Rolls 1885-1940; and some Ships passenger lists.

MASSACHUSETTS RESEARCH

Massachusetts was the first state in the Union to establish laws governing public record keeping. The State Library of Massachussets, 341 State House, Beacon Street, Boston, MA 02133 will honor requests by mail. Copies are 15 cents per page, a maximum of 15 pages or a minimum of \$1.00. also, the Massachussets State Archives, State House, Beacon Street, Boston, MA 02133, now has justody of vital records from 1841-1890, including all adoptions and illegitimate births. These are open to the public. -- from North Pines Genealogy Group Newsletter, North Pines News.

COLORADO RESEARCH

The Denver Public Library, 1357 Broadway, Denver, CO 80203-2165 has a 40 page pamphlet, "Guide to the Genealogy Division of the Denver Public Library." The cost is \$2.60 ppd., and the library advises they will do research for a fee.--from the Illinois Genealogical Society Newsletter.

EAST GERMAN RESEARCH

Some success has been reported in receiving information from the German Democratic Republic about villages of origin in that region. Responses to inquiries are not always forthcoming, however. response provided eight birth and marriage records dating back to about 1764, for a billing of \$13. Help has come from the Central Office for Gamealogy in the DDR. The following approach is eyegested (but not guaranteed): Give exact name of ancestor, date of birth or marriage and exact village. Offer to pay a fee (there will be one) but don't send money. Send at least two international reply coupons. And never refer to East Germany. Address: Zentralstelle fur Genealogie in der DDR, DDR-7010 Leipzig, Gerogi-Dimitroff-Platz 1, German Democratic Republic. (Letters can be written in English, but records and reply received were in German.--from the Chicago Genealogical Society Newsletter.
