#### 1986 MEETING OF THE CENTRAL WISCONSIN GENEALOGICAL SOCIETIES PLANNED

The annual meeting of Central Wisconsin Genealogical Societies will be held on Saturday, September 27th at the BeeBee Forum Room of the Marshfield Public Library. Registration, coffee and rolls, will begin at 9:30 a.m.

Three topics of interest to many genealogists will be featured in this day-long seminar.

In the morning session, Don Schnitzler will discuss what records are available to the family history researcher interested in learning more about his Revolutionary War and Civil War Ancestors. The overview will highlight those records held by the National Archives, but will also point out other sources of information on the local, state and national level.

In the afternoon. Deanne Reyer will tell us what to do for successful letter writing in her presentation, "What to say in Your Genealogical Correspondence." Besides covering some of the basics of good letter writing, she will provide tips on asking questions, and encouraging replies.

The afternoon session will also feature a panel discussion on the keys to planning a successful family reunion. Members of the Marshfield Area Genealogy Group members will form the panel.

Following these presentations, Karen Boerboom, will briefly introduce her German Phone Book Collection and explain how to use them as a resource and begin correspondence with overseas relatives.

An open lunch period is scheduled from noon until 1:00 p.m. During this time, meeting participants are on their own. They may use the meeting room at the library for a sack lunch or visit one of several resaurants in the area.

Those interested in doing research at the library can do so during the lunch hour or following the meeting. In addition, to the resources of the Marshfield Library, microfilm copies of the 1880 Wisconsin Soundex and 1905 Wood County Census Index will be available.

The programs planned for this seminar should entice many persons to the meeting. But in addition to the meetings, numerous door prizes will be awarded throughout the day.

#### NOTES FROM THE LIBRARY

The library is growing again! Members have been very generous in the past few months, increasing the size of our library by at least two boxes. Researchers in Ohio will be pleased as many of the donations are Ohio newsletters and research material. An annonymous donor has given a large selection of newsletters entitled *The Gateway to the West-Ohio*. The volumes include marriages, death records, deed abstracts, will abstracts, indexes to estates, cemetery listings and much, much more. They are indexed at the end of each year making this an even more valuable source. The donor is not a member of our group but wanted to share her books with us.

Elaine Bennett was busy cleaning out her research shelves. Her donations include *The Report*, the newsletter from the Ohio Genealogical Society for the years 1981-1984. These are also indexed at the end of the year. They are filled with lists of all the good things genealogists want to look through.

Elaine also donated the *National Genealogical Inquirer*. It is published in West Allis but has information from all over the U.S. It has inquiries, family heritage and articles by Maralyn A. Wellauer.

Again from Elaine, Family Records Today a Journal of American Family Records. This has articles on black genealogy, Indian genealogy, queries, etc.

Even more from Elaine, *The Connecticut Nutmegger*, a newsletter from the Connecticut Society of Genealogists. Great research material! If you have New England roots, these will be a big help. Loaded with lists and indexed queries, they are an important addition to our library.

#### STATE PIONEER CERTIFICATES

A supplement is being prepared to Some Pioneer Families of Wisconsin. an Index 1977. To be included applications must be submitted by December 31, 1986.

The Wisconsin State Genealogical Society invites you to obtain a Pioneer Family Certificate showing ancestors who settled in Wisconsin by 1850, or a Century Family Certificate, showing ancestors who settled at least a century ago.

Applicants must be able to prove descent from ancestors by an offical record, but need not presently live in Wisconsin. Proof furnished will be verified by WSGS personnel from referenced data and records before a certificate is issued.

#### WASHINGTON VITAL RECORDS

Vital records in the state of Washington are available from the Dept of Vital Records, P.O. Box 9709, ET11, Olympia, Washington 98504-9579.

Their holdings include, birth and death records from July 1907 and Marriage and Dissolution records from January 1968. To obtain Birth records, you need to provide the name at time of birth or adoption, date of birth, place of birth, father's fullname mother's full maiden name. For a death record you should provide the fullname, date of death and place of death. Marriage and Dissolution records require both husband's and wife's full names, date and county where occurred. fee is \$6 per search or copy.

#### CIVIL WAR PHOTOGRAPHY

The U.S. Army Military History Institute at Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania 17013 has been recognized for some time because of the wealth of information it contains on the Civil War.

photographic holdings at The the Institute are extensive, fact, they one of the nation's best for the 1861 to 1865 period. The nucleus is the 168 volumes. containing over 40,000 images. рA the Massachusetis Commandery of the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States. In addition to this there are over 10,000 photos in other collections, all dealing with the Civil War.

The subjects contained in these photos are as broad as your imagination cares to roam. There are views of camp scenes, depots, railroads, famous buildings and terrain views. There is almost no limit to uniform, insignia and equipment information. Also, the collection of identified soldiers' portraits is unmatched anywhere.

The depth of the portrait holdings varies for different regions. The New England and Atlantic areas are much better represented than the Middle West and West. The holdings of Confederates are very few for those under the rank of general. Also. officers are more often found than enlisted men. Although there is not a photo of every Civil War Soldier at the institute yet, the curators are striving accomplish exactly that.

The Institute would welcome any donations of Civil War photographs or the opportunity to make copies of them for their files. In either case contact the Curator at the address above.

If you are seeking a photo of a soldier, or soldiers, contact the Military History Institute. They will check their card files for names and/or regiments and send Xerox copies (limit 10 per patron) of what they have, along with reproduction charges. The Institute is open to the public, weekdays, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Other holdings of the U.S. Army History Institute includes over 300,000 volumes; 60,000 periodicals; 500,000 photographs; 40,000 audio/visual items; 75,000 military artifacts; 3,000,000 personal manuscripts, diaries and letters; and about 100,000 classified and unclassified documents.
