

to include the male and female lines of that person's ancestors.

A genealogy, in contrast, begins with a single ancestor and traces forward in time to include all descendants to the present time.

## GERMAN RESEARCH INFORMATION

When writing a state archives in any German-speaking country, do not send money. They'll bill for their services and inform you where and how to send the money. When writing to a parish, enclose a donation of \$10 as a courtesy.

In your correspondence to Germany, express dates in the following order: day, month (spelled out), year. The months are Januar, Februar, Maerz, April, Mai, Juni, Juli, August, September, Oktober, November and Dezember.

The Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City has form letters available for writing to Poland, France, and Czechoslavakia for genealogical information.—from the Clark County (WA) Genealogical Society Newsletter.

# Grand Army of the Republic

G.A.R.: The Grand Army of the Republic was a society of men who had fought for the North in the Civil War. The organization was founded by Benjamin F. Stephenson on April 6, 1866 at Decatur, Illinois. The society was founded to strengthen fellowship among who fought to preserve the Union, to honor those killed in the war, to provide care of their dependents, and to uphold the Constitution.

G.A.R. membership was open to honorably discharged soldiers, sailors or marines on the Union forces who served between April 12, 1861 and April 9, 1865. Its last member died in 1955 and the organization was discontinued in 1956. The G.A.R. initiated the celebration of Memorial Day in the North by a general order issued by John A. Logan.—From the Antique Week, Genealogy Week Section.
