You may wish to share with the group how you solved a particular research problem or your experience visiting a particular library or courthouse. On the other hand you may find an article or research tip pertinent to genealogy that would be appropriate for the Board of newsletter. The Directors at the meeting of March 23, 1989 had suggested that a portion of the members be asked to contribute to the newsletter on a rotating basis. Those individuals whose last name begins with "E" through "L" are asked to submit something for the newsletter by June 30, 1989 if they have not already done so. Those who have submitted their contribution ahead of time are greatly appreciated!

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QUERIES ---by Barb Mahler

Queries are a valuable tool the search for genealogical information. The purpose of the Query is to bring together people who are interested in the same line of ancestry or descendents. Kith and Kin is circulated through out Wisconsin. M.A.G.G. members are encouraged to submit queries for inclusion.

The query can be written like the one in the next column. When two persons make contact as the result of a query, matters can be fully discussed between them. Include a reasonable, but not excessive, amount of information

about that individual. If you are unable to give a nearly complete description of the person about whom you are looking for infor-(mation, consider starting with a son or daughter about whom you can give a good description --- then ask for that person's ancestry.

A list of each surname should be included. Each surname should have every letter capitalized. The first line should tell what you want, need, request, seeking or are looking for. If there is enough space, the last line may express appreciation. Brevity may add to clarity, but DON'T over abbreviate. It has been recommended that a telephone number be included. You should look over previous queries composing one of your own.

Want all ancestors of John SMITH born 12 Jan 1900 NY, died 20 (Feb 1968 Madison, WI son of Joseph and Ethel (WILLIAMS) SMITH and his wife (married 16 May 1921 Madison, WI) Mary JONES born 2 Feb 1901 Beloit, WI, died 16 Jun 1972 Madison, WI, daughter of Daniel and Doris (BROWN) JONES.

DOING NORWEGIAN RESEARCH?

Prof. Gerhard B. Naeseth, volunteer for the Vesterheim Genealogical Center, Decorah, Iowa, has been a major force in acquiring the following items of interest for those digging up Norwegian roots.

- 1. More than 600 reels of microfilm of Norwegian church records. At present the microfilm are housed and serviced in the Microforms Reading Room of the University of Wisconsin Memorial Library.
- 2. Microfilms of Norwegian passport records and a microfiche record of passports for Bergen, 1874-1924, a gift of the University of Bergen.
- The 1801 census of Norway on microfiche.
- 4. The 1875 census of Oslo, a gift of the University of Bergen.
 - 5. A card index to emigrants from Telemark, supplied by a team of the Norwegian Genealogical Society.
 - 6. A copy of a card file listing the emigrants from Rogaland.
 - 7. 22 linear feet of shelving of Norwegian local histories.
 - 8. 21 linear feet of shelving of Norwegian and Norwegian-American family histories.
 - 9. 11 linear feet of indexes to Norwegian Census records, compiled by the University of Tromso, from which it was acquired.
 - 10. Extensive abstracts of emigration records from Norway, collected by Naeseth.
 - 11. Transcripts of about 300 Norwegian- American cemeteries, made by Naeseth.

- 12. Transcripts of Norwegians in American census records, 1850, 1860, 1880, made by Naeseth.
- 13. Transcripts of Norwegians in American passenger lists, 1825-1860, made by Naeseth.
- 14. 10 linear feet of shelving of Norwegian-American local history material.
- 15. Transcripts of a number of American church records, made by Naeseth.
- 16. Card indexes to some of these church records, made by Naeseth.

MISSING KENTUCKY RECORDS

When receiving a reply from a Kentucky county courthouse which says that "records are missing", write to the Kentucky Archives in Frankfort. While some records are moved missing, many have been there because local courthouses have neither the space or facilities for records. Many records have been microfilmed. With changes in county clerks, the present clerk may not be aware that the records have been moved to Frankfort. Write: Kentucky Department of Library Archives, 300 Coffee Tree Road, P.O. The records consist of baptisms, confirmations, weddings, funerals, etc. and minutes of congregation and council meetings. 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NEW JERSEY MARRIAGES

were New Jersey marriages recorded from 1665 to 1800 on marriage bonds (approximarely 25% of them, the rest were banns). State-wide registration of marriages did not begin until 1848. From that date most marriages are available either from the county clerk, published sources, or on microfilm. Marriages after April 1878 to the present are available at the New Jersey Department of Health, Bureau of Vital Statistics CN 360, Trenton, NJ 08625. is also the place to write for births after April 1878 and for deaths for the same period. GENEALOGICAL CORRESPONDENCE

Avoid vague general questions when writing to libraries. (Do you have anything on John Smith?) Keep your questions specific (Do you have published family histories on the Smith family?) They are much easier for the libraries to handle, and you are more likely to get an answer.

To make things even easier, and if your questions can be briefly answered, encourage the library to write the answer in the margin of your letter and have them send it back. The library can respond more quickly as it eliminates the need for someone to compose an entire letter. Offer to pay for and of course. photo-copies include a self addressed stamped envelope.--from Nuggets, fox Valley Genealogical Society, Appleton, NI, Vol. 7, No. 2, September 1988, p. 70.

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S.A.S.E. NOT ENOUGH

When looking for a reply to correspondence, a S.A.S.E.(Self Addressed Stamped Envelope) may not be enough. A S.A.S.E. is generally enclosed to encourage a written response. Today some people are more likely to use the telephone. So why not include your telephone number to encourage a telephone response?

Also a postcard may be more appropriate than a S.A.S.E. When writing to a person, whom you do not know, who may or may not be a relative a postcard may encourage a response. The postcard might have "check off" lines for: (1) related but contact someone else, (2) related write again and (3) not related. When writing to a courthouse or archive consider enclosing a postcard. The postcard

might have "check off" lines for:

(1) Yes, this record is available, the cost is____. The record is recorded in Vol.___ page #___.

(2) No, this record is not available at this office, try____. and (3) No, this record is not available at this office.

MILITARY(To start research in RECORDS - WORLD WARS I and II, request NATF Form 180, "Request Pertaining to Military Records" from the Reference Services Branch (NNIR), National Archives and Record Services, Washington, DC 20408. Information from World War I and II era records is released only with written permission of the veteran, or if deceased, the veteran's next of kin. -- from M. C. 6. S. 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DOCUMENTING YOUR RESEARCH

The importance of documenting your research cannot be over When filling out stressed. forms, use a genealogical note system (1,2,3...) for each piece of information, and then the record your source for information on the bottom or the blank back of the form. Then if information conflicting arises in the future, you can quickly and easily check where you obtained the original.--from Nuggets, Fox Valley Genealogical Society, Appleton, MI, Vol. 7, No. 2, September 1988, p. 70.
