## TIPS ON DOCUMENT PRESERVATION

When storing photos in an album, use "photo" or "archival" mounting corners (available from photography suppliers or stamo glued or self dealers), not sealing plastic (which can stick

· · to or react with your pictures). To remove the musty smell from old books, make sure thev are dry. Fut them in a <u>cool</u> dry space for a couple of days, or put them outside on a table in the sun on a dry breezy day for a couple of hours. If the musty smell remains, put them in an open container (e.g., polyethylene pail or box) inside a larger. closed container (e.g., a clean, dry garbage pail or a box) with an open box of baking soda or a potpourri. [or fresh Do not allow the kittv litter] deodorizer to touch the books. Leave for a few days in a cool place, check once a day to make sure no mold is growing. Remove to a safe storage environment. 3. To remove stables or old. paper clips from documents (especially rusty ones), slide a piece of stiff plastic (e.g., polyester or polypropylene) under the fastener on both sides of the document. Slide the paper clip off the plastic, or use a pair of tweezers or a thin knife to bend the edges of the staple up and pry it out. The plastic will protect the paper from the abrasion of your tools.

## RECORDING NEWSPAPER & PERIODICAL SOURCES

When recording the reference where you obtained information from a newspaper you should include: 1. Name of the Newspaper (place of publication optional), 2. Date of the issue and 3. Page numbers as well as section and column numbers, if considered necessary. For your own personal information and being able to find the source again, especially for that hard to find book, you should also record: 4. The location and/or form of record used. If you publish your material, you may or may not wish to include this information for your readers. If you are referring to a specific article in a newspaper, then you should use the form for a and the above periodical information should be preceded by: 1. Name of the author(s) and 2. Title of the article. For denealogy, record your source as reference; you can always chance it to bibliographic form. Some examples are:

## SOME HELP FOR CD USERS

The IGI can be downloaded either in Gedcom Format recognized by most genealogy software programs or in standard format. There individuals who have used both successfully.

The Gedcom format transfers easily into most family records programs. Some, however, like to keep the data in a seperate database like PC-File.

There are commercial programs which will convert the Gedcom format into any regular database. program called Gipsi One transfers the Gedcom format neatly from the IGI into a database. Gipsi stands for Genealogical Index Processing System and Interpreter. It is a shareware program by Research Services, 779 East 5050 South, UT 84403, Ooden phone 801-479-3553.

The following is a summary of the records to be found in the Wood County Courthouse, 400 Market Street, Wisconsin Rapids WI 54494.

# REGISTER OF DEEDS -- Room 233

- 1. Marriage Records from 1867
- 2. Birth Certificates from 1876 (Also delayed Birth records)
- 3. Death Certificates from 1877 (Note: Only Certified Copies are available, \$4.00).
- 4. Land Records
  - a. Deeds
  - b. Mortgages
  - c. Powers of Attorney
  - d. Various documents affecting land titles. Real estate cannot be sold to settle an estate unless all living heirs of the deceased person are located. Thus much information is gleaned as to names of descendants and their places of residence.
  - e. Survey Records
  - f. Subdivision Plats -- Recorded from when the land was first settled in the 1880's
  - g. Plat Books, various dates available (Note: Current Plat Books for Wood County with an index to owners may be purchased for \$5.10 from the University Extention Office in the Courthouse.)
- 5. Name Changes
- 6. Military Records -- Index to Soldier and Sailors Discharges Confidential (Note: Check with the Veterans Office in Room 126. They will help with military records. Some are confidential; copies can be obtained of others.)

## CLERK OF COURT -- Room 331

- 1. Criminal Records
- 2. Civil Records -- included are actions for the following:
  - a. Possession of Property, both real and personal
  - b. For Partition of Property
  - c. To Quit Title
  - d. Foreclosures
  - e. Divorces
  - f. Naturalization Records
  - g. Liens
  - h. Judgements
- 3. Other Miscellaneous Records

# COUNTY CLERK -- Room 213

- 1. School Census Records from 1918 to 1964. The schools then consolidated. The records are now held in each High School District.
- 2. Old Wood County Normal School Transcript Records. Records are on file until the school closed.
- 3. Marriage Applications. An index is available for searching names and dates. The application itself is confidential and is not available.

# REGISTER OF PROBATE -- Room 346

- 1. Probate Records -- included here are the following records:
  - a. Wills
  - b. Petitions for Probate of Wills
  - c. Letters of Administration and Petitions for Same
  - d: Bonds of Executors or Administrators
  - e. Inventories and Appraisement Papers
  - f. Petitions to Determine Heirship
  - g. Decrees of Distribution of Estate
  - Releasement by Heirs
  - Guardiachip Papers and Adoption Proceedings
    - Sale of Real Estate of Intestates
  - k. Juvenile Records -- closed
  - 1. Mental Records -- closed
  - m. University Hospital Records
- 2. Other Records

(Note: Some of these records are closed to the public, but they can be opened with a court order.)
