Selecting a Computer for Genealogy

1. Get comfortable with computers. Read about them, talk to genealogists who are using them, ask questions - what they like and what they dislike about their computer and programs: genealogy, word processing and others.

2. Don't feel you are too old to learn. People of all ages are learning to use computers and enjoy them.

3. Try using a friend's computer, with their permission of course. Sitting down and working at the computer is the best way to learn about the computer & what it would be like on one of your own.

4. Don't overlook the computer classes being offered in many of our adult education programs. No, it's not working on your genealogy, but it will help you learn how the computer functions.

5. Chose a computer that best meets your needs, both for genealogy and otherwise. Do some comparative shopping before you buy. Remember, that for storing genealogical information you will likely need at least 512K.

6. Get two disk drives instead of one, or better yet a hard drive and one or two floppy drives. Most likely, you will need one disk drive for the program & the other disk drive for the data information.

7. Choose a keyboard that looks and feels like a real typewriter.

8. Don't buy a bargain priced printer. Ask yourself these questions:

- a. What type of forms do I want to print?
- b. Do I need special paper?
- c. What type of print does it have?
- d. How fast does it print?
- e. Which of the above is the most important to me; which is least?

9. An 80 column monochrome monitor is recommended with at least a 9 inch screen. Consider a green or amber screen. Be sure to check the monitor to see if you can read the characters clearly, even at the sides & in the corners of the screen. This will be important to you as a genealogist.

10. After you have made your purchase be sure to protect these machines from dust. **DUST IS THE WORST ENEMY OF YOUR COMPUTER.**

MARSHFIELD'S SMALLEST CEMETERY

CITY'S SMALLEST CEMETERY?---Section hand Alfred Marohl (left) [in the photo for original newspaper article] Stratford, and forman Frank Kalkowski, Hatley, inspect the grave marker which stands in solitude in a wild and overgrown portion of the right-of-way about a quarter-mile south of E. Fourth street between the lines of the Chicago & North Western and Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault St. Marie Railroads. According to the cast iron marker, it surmounts the resting place of Albert Blaeser, born July 3, 1887; died May 5, 1916. The tale of railroadmen is that Blaeser was a switchman who was mangled under a train and buried beside the rails where he died. However, a search of three local newspapers of the time failed to unearth any record of such tragedy and the death is not recorded in the city clerk's files.--from *Marshfield News-Herald* (Marshfield, Wisconsin) 15 July 1961, p. 1. [Thanks to Lorraine Markee.]
