DO YOUR AUTOBIOGRAPHY

FINDING WOMEN'S GRAVES

When looking for the grave of a woman, check the records under both the married and maiden names. Women were buried under their maiden names from time to time. It is also important to remember that she may have remarried if her husband died previously. When a man and women are buried side by side with only one stone, do not assume that they were husband and wife. This assumption will be true most of the time but it is not uncommon for a brother and sister to be burried together. It is always better to secure positive proof rather than by including such assumptions as fact.

CHANGES AT THE NEWBERRY LIBRARY'S LOCAL & FAMILY HISTORY SECTION

The Local and Family History Section operates in the Smith Family Genealogy Reference Center on the second floor of the Newberry. The top to bottom renovation of the Library's Cobb Building, completed in 1985, left its operations with an expanded open shelf reference collection and a specialized reference post.

Follow-up changes, however, are required in this area. Thanks to a generous grant from the Allen-Heath Foundation, we are currently in the process of implementing these changes.

A major change is the reclassification of the reference collection. The collection, now divided between two classification systems, will become a single cataloguing sequence. Browsing the collections will become much easier for Library patrons under the new system-books covering the same topics once located in different parts of the reading room now will be shelved together.

As part of the reclassification process, all reference collection books will be included in the Library's on line computer catalogue, making the on line catalogue a more comprehensive and useful reference tool. The projected extension of on line catalogue access to Library patrons in the Genealogy Reference Center on the second floor makes this development even more significant. A new terminal will be installed in the second floor reference area, making it unnecessary for patrons to travel between floors in order to consult it.

Other important changes include the expansion of reference desk counter space, additional shelving for census indexes and increased storage for census microfilm in the area.

The Czechoslovak Heritage Museum, Library and Archives has been in existence since 1974, when the CSA Fraternal Life Association moved into its new offices at 2701 S HARLEM AVE, BERWYN IL 60402-2122. Hours are from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., M-F. Telephone 708-795-5800.

The library contains some of the following holdings: CSA Archives from 1854, rare books which date from 1630, photos of early 1900 Chicago-Czech neighborhoods, a collection of bibles and prayer books dating from 1800, sculptures by Albin Polasek, and special exhibits of Czech, Moravian and Slovak cultures.

If one of your ancestors was ever a prisoner of War, you should know that a service exists to help you with the P.O.W.'s records. This service covers any war, even the Civil War. Send a SASE to: Andersonville National Historic Site, ROUTE 1, BOX 85, ANDERSONVILLE GA 31711. You should include the serviceman's name, which war, and any information you may have, such as what unit he was with. You will be billed for copy costs only.

GERMAN POSTAL CODES

On 1 July 1993, all German postal codes changed from four digits to five digits. The letters "W" and "O" are no longer be used because all towns in the reunited Germany are now integrated alphabetically, and new postal codes have been assigned. The 209 larger cities have been subdivided into several delivery zones, each with its own postal code. The exact address is needed to find the correct new postal code. When writing to Germany, it is important to use the correct postal code because many towns have the same name.

TRICKY WAY TO FIGURE BIRTH DATE

Often tombstones will have a notation such as: "Died 15 June 1872, age 77 years, 10 months, 3 days". How do we determine the correct birth date? First of all, make the sequence read days, months, years: thus 15-6-1872 minus 3-10-77. Since the 10th month cannot be subtracted from the sixth, borrow 12 months from the year of death, making the year 1871 and the month 18. (If you have to borrow from the month to make days, borrow 30 days even though the month

might have 31). The equation now looks like: 15-18-1871 minus 3-10-77. Begin the calculations on the right hand side. Therefore, 77 years from 1871 means that the person was born in 1794. Subtracting 10 months from 18 gives you 8 months or August. So the correct date of birth was 12 August 1794.

[Ed's Note: PAF (Personal Ancestral File) has a Gregorian Date Calculator that calculated the same birth date. It also has small calendars for the corresponding months. It is of interest to note that 12 August 1794 was on a Tuesday and 15 June 1872 was on a Saturday. To get to the PAF calendar from the MAIN MENU select 9. Fact and Fun. From the FACTS AND FUN MENU select 6. Date Calculator and read the instructions.

For those with an IBM Compatible Computer who do not have PAF you may wish to get a copy of GENKIT16 from the Computer Genealogy Interest Group of Central Wisconsin. It gives a different date. Calculations and calculated dates often are incorrect. The bottom line is to use the specific date when you can get it.]

Selected records of the Milwaukee County Register of Deeds were microfilmed by the Genealogical Society of Utah and duplicated for the UW-Milwaukee Area Research Center, room 225 of the library. The records filmed are as follows: Index of Births, 1823-1932; Register of Births, 1854-1911; Court Ordered Name Changes, 1871-1977; Index of Deaths, 1872-1916; Register of Deaths, 1852-1912; Index of Marriages, 1830-1918; Register of Marriages, 1838-1911; Grantee Index to Deeds, 1835-1907; Grantor Index to Marriages, 1836-1901 and Index to Lis Pendens.

MICROFILMING YOUR GENEALOGY **CORRECTION!**

The following is a correction to "Microfilming Your Genealogy," Kith and Kin (Marshfield Area Genealogy Group, Marshfield, Wisconsin) 9:6 (Mar-Apr 1993), p. 60. It is taken from a letter, Stephen S.
