PIONEER/CENTURY FAMILY CERTIFICATES PROGRAM REVAMPED

Clarification of purpose, more stringent standards, a new application form, clearer instructions and better-looking certificates are features of the revised Wisconsin State Genealogical Society Pioneer and Century Family Certificates Program. The Society will begin issuing the new application forms and instructions immediately, but will continue to accept applications submitted on old forms until 1 March 1994, after which applications will be returned for resubmission on new forms.

The most significant aspect of the revised program is the clarification of purpose, namely, to recognize families with Wisconsin Roots, encourage people to undertake genealogical research, develop a database of information for researchers. and to improve the quality of genealogical research. The tightening of standards is intended to improve the quality of research and will also result in a more useful genealogical database. A separate instruction sheet that accompanies application forms will make the forms much easier to use and clarifies what is considered as acceptable proof. Proof of both settlement in Wisconsin and direct line descent is required.

Pioneer Family Certificates are awarded to persons who can prove that an ancestor settled in Wisconsin in the year 1850 or earlier, and who can prove direct descent from that ancestor.

Century Family Certificates require that the ancestor settled in Wisconsin after 1850, but 100 years or more prior to the date of the application. The person to whom the certificate is issued need not currently reside in Wisconsin. The attractive 11 by 8 1/2 inch certificates, bearing the seal of the W.S.G.S., are suitable for framing.

GENEALOGY/FAMILY HISTORY BOOK AWARD

A BOOK AWARD OF MERIT IN GENEALOGY is presented at the Annual Meeting of the State Historical Society in June of each year. The award is given to the author of that book, published in the previous year, which in the opinion of the awards judges, makes the most valuable contribution in presenting an individual genealogy pertaining to a Wisconsin family. Preference will be given to works which develop a historical narrative approach to their subject.

This category has been created to encourage the publishing of well-written and well-documented genealogies and family histories. It does not pertain to instructional, bibliographic works, published source material or indexes, but rather is awarded to the product of genealogical research.

PRESERVE YOUR PAST

The Maryland State Archives has devised some ingenious preservation systems that may be useful in your home library. Archivists in Annapolis have been tucking Colonial Militia Muster Rolls, Revolutionary Oaths of Fidelity, the Census of 1776 and other historic papers into acid-neutral folders and boxes that should help preserve their contents for hundreds of years. In fact, the Archives now sell a home Paper Preservation Kit for letters, photos and newspaper clippings, which includes acid-free document folders and film document sleeves, acid-free bond paper for photocopying papers that are disintegrating, a soft- bristle brush, cheese cloth and a special storage box. ARE YOU READY TO DO RESEARCH OVERSEAS

Just because "Family Tradition" or a census report says that your great-grandfather was born in Germany (for instance) does not mean your next step in research is in Germany or the German records available here. Unless and until you have exhausted your possibilities in this country, it would be premature to try to go to overseas records. Basically genealogical research pertaining to an immigrant to the United States begins with the passenger lists, expands to customs and immigration lists and indexes, and progresses to the Declaration of Intent and finally to the naturalization records themselves. It is these various records you will want to check to achieve a point of departure for overseas research. Usually those records yield enough information to give you a clue about where to look in Germany. So, until you can narrow your search to a town or region in Germany, you are not ready to cross the oceans.

CASCADING PEDIGREE CHARTS, A STORY

Our genealogy group was collecting five generation charts. I was in the process of transferring my family history from a program on the *Atari* to the **Personal Ancestral File (PAF)**

on a DOS based computer. I had submitted my information using the old program. I had carefully selected the five generation charts to use the fewest pages. But, I had some new information that was only on the new computer.

The final collection date was close. I decided to submit a new *full set* of five generation charts. I had noticed a cascading pedigree option in PAF that would index as well. When I checked the manual, the cascading pedigree had only four generations. I had 23 of the five generation charts without the additional information. I could imagine the number of four generation chart I would get. I was looking for a five generation cascading pedigree program. I could transfer data into a couple of different computer genealogy programs that I had.

First, I tried Family Origins for Windows. It had nice five generation charts for the cascading pedigree, but it used such large print that the first name was often all that was printed. Sometimes the last name was only an initial. I wanted more information on each individual. Next I tried PAF Viewer for Windows. It had only four generation charts for the cascading pedigree. Again, the charts were pretty but they too left out information.

Finally, I tried **Brother's Keeper**. I liked their five generation single charts. I could not find out if the cascading pedigree had four or five generations. I was getting frustrated. So I figured that I would print it out anyway. An Ahnentafel from the new data was 17 pages. The old information was 23 pages. With the new information it should be about 30 pages. Even with printing four generations per page it should not be more than 60 pages, so I thought. I let it print out. It printed four generations charts, 114 charts! I couldn't believe it.

I decided to print out individual five generation charts from **Brother's Keeper**. They look nice. It took me more than half a day. It came to 33 charts. *Does anyone want 114, slightly used, four generation charts?*

NOW IT'S ALL CLEAR...OR IS IT?

The child of your parents' brother or sister is your first cousin. However, your first cousin's child is not your second cousin, but your first cousin once removed. The child of your first cousin once removed is your first cousin twice removed, and his child is your first cousin three times removed.

Your second cousin is your grandparents' brother's or sister's grandchild. That second cousin's child is your second cousin once removed, and his child is your second cousin twice removed.

And your third cousin? It's your great-grandparents' brother's or sister's great-grandchild. The third cousin's child is your third cousin once removed, and his child is your third cousin twice removed.

The grandchild of your brother or sister is your grandnephew or grandniece.

The sister or brother of your grandparent is your great-aunt or great-uncle.

The sister or brother of your great-grandparent is your great-grand-aunt, or great-grand-uncle.

TAPE RECORDERS AND ORAL HISTORY INTERVIEWS

David Thackery, curator, Local and Family History Section at the Newberry Library. He states that the tape recorder is the genealogist's friend and can save note-taking when doing interviews with elderly members of one's family. The inclusion of oral history interviews in published genealogies (and one sees very little of them) would considerably enhance their interest and value within the family while at the same time potentially broadening the book's audience to include non-relations, whether they be academic social historians or the local historical society which so often takes great pains to distinguish itself from "the genealogists." The tape can then be transcribed and later included in a published family history.

In addition to the "who, where and when" questions, should be added the questions of how and why. At this stage one often encounters the treasure troves of family photographs, which can contribute so much to making family members more than so many names. Broad and general questions such as "What was life like then?" or "Can you describe what so and so was like?" can often elicit revealing details in which the personality of the family member and social realities of the time merge.

MILITARY RECORDS AND CERTIFICATES

WI Veterans Museum, 30 W. Mifflin St., Madison, WI 53707-7843, Telephone 608-266-1680 has a computer database of Wisconsin's Civil War enlistments, accessible to the public for \$5.00 each, if you visit the museum. The database contains information on individual soldiers, including place of enlistment, changes in rank, years of service and date of discharge. For a fee, \$5.00 if you visit or \$6.00 by mail, you can obtain a "Certificate of Service" containing the soldier's name, a list of engagements in which his unit fought and a historical sketch of the unit. NEW NATIONAL GENEALOGY RESEARCH BULLETIN BOARD SERVICE

The American Genealogical Lending Library (AGLL) has announced a NEW national genealogical researcher's computer Bulletin Board Service (BBS) that is totally unique to the genealogy community. Over 35 different databases and services are available to the subscriber including census indexes, marriage records (over 3.6 million names), the company's microfilm catalog for browsing and ordering, and a national Genealogy Message Center. Any user will be able to communicate electronically with the AGLL Sales and Customer Service departments.

Subscription fees are \$15.00 per month or an annual membership of \$165.00 (pay for eleven and receive one month free). AGLL members can subscribe for \$150.00 (pay for ten and receive two months free). Each subscriber will receive one full hour per month FREE to use on the BBS. On-line charges are \$.25 per minute after the FREE hour has been used. To download information, a charge of \$.50 per name per index (up to ten names) and a \$.30 for each additional name will be made. All fees and BBS use charges will be made to the user's credit card. Those not using credit cards will be required to establish a deposit account. There are no other fees or hidden costs.

The AGLL BBS will be available to user access February 7, 1994. Those wishing to subscribe may do so at any time by calling the AGLL Sales Department (801) 298-5446 or (800) 305-AGLL and subscribe electronically. A free five minute demonstration of the AGLL BBS can be seen by calling (801) 299-0087. Additional information is available by calling the AGLL Sales Department.

The purpose of the Bureau was to "collect and preserve in permanent form the name of every person who has (served in the present war) and

the personal history of such person while in such service, as far as can be ascertained."

This private non-profit educational corporation would like to restore the large collection of civil war material as well as some 2,000 original soldier photographs and once again place them on exhibition. In addition, they would like to collect material from other wars.

They are now in the process of collecting memorabilia and questionnaires from veterans and/or their families.
