MILITARY RECORDS AT STATE ARCHIVES

(Last months Kith and Kin, V11 #1, p 8 listed archives from Kansas through Massachusetts as a continued list - it was actually the middle of the list, this is the beginning! ed)

The State Archives will often have information not available at the national level. Some states have great facilities, and others (often due to a lack of funding) don't.

One of the advantages of writing to the State Archives is that you will get a response back much faster than when you write to the National Archives. If your soldier is Confederate, you must write to the state in which he served. Pension records for confererate soldiers are only kept at the State Archives. If the soldier was in the state militia and not a volunteer then he will have no records in the National Archives.

Most states will send a brief abstract of a particular soldier at no cost to you. The following list of addresses by state was downloaded from the Genealogical Club of America Online.

All words, symbols, and abbreviations in the dictionary were chosen on the basis of their association with genealogy. having been noted in church records, civil registration records, family correspondence, genealogical journals, ships' passenger listsand emigration records. Among the many categories of entries included in the dictionary are family relationships, days of the week, map terms, legal terms, cardinal and ordinary numbers, roman numerals, signs of the zodiac, coins, liquid and dry measures, measures of length, place names, historical territories, geographical terms, occupations, titles, military ranks, types of taxes, illnesses, calendar days, male and female given names, heraldry, abbreviations, books of the Bible, and common genealogical words from Danish, Dutch, French, Latin and Polish. In conjunction with a standard German-English dictionary, the user of this work should be able to make a word-by-word translation of any German document

GENEALOGY COURSES FALL 1994

Opportunities to learn the methods of genealogical research will bee available this fall via Educational Teleconference Network (ETN). ETN is an audio network that transmits over telephone lines to more than 170 sites around Wisconsin (Marshfield's is the UW Center). Each classroom has an amplifier and microphones for participants to listen and interact with the instructor. No technical skill is required. All courses are taught by James Hansen, reference librarian and genealogist for the State Historical Society of WIsconsin.

Introduction to Genealogical Research

ETN Weds, Sep. 7 - Oct 5. 7 - 8:20 pm This course is for beginners in genealogical research. It focuses mainly on American information sources, particularly those in Wisconsin and the Eastern states, with some attention to European sources. Lectures discuss basic procedures and access to courthouse, library, census and cemetery records.

Advanced Genealogy

ETN: Weds, Oct 19 - Nov 16, 7 - 8:20 pm This series is for those who have progressed beyond elementary genealogical research. Presentations cover research techniques., access to records, identification of new sources, and solutions to difficult problems.

Correspondence Course: Intro to Genealogy

For those who wish to study at home and at their own page, this course provides a solid background in the techniques of tracing one's family tree. In addition to 13 reading assignments, students take three research trips (to a county courthouse, a library, and a church or cemetery) and submit a brief written report on each. FRENCH-CANADIAN MATERIALS BROWN COUNTY LIBRARY

The French Canadian book collection at the BCL received a major boost in 1993. The addition of over 250 volumes on French-Canadian research brings the collection to over 400 volumes and makes it one of the best in a Public Library in Wisconsin. In addition to volumes which focus on individual parishes in Quebec Province there are approximately 20 books that are about French-Canadian immigrants and/or communities in specific communities in New England.

PHOTOGRAPH FADING STUDIED

According to the new book The Permanance and care of Color Photographs by Henry Wilhelm, Fujicolor SFA3 paper, introduced in 1992, can withstand 50 years of display without color change. Kodak Ektacolor and other papers (including Fuji papers) have a predicted "display life: of only 12 years. If you have negatives and want new prints for display, ask your photo studio what paper they use.

From the College & Research Library News: DON'T put that handy little Post-it note on library materials or you could cause staining and permanent damage. They were designed for short-term use on non-permanent materials. After a month or two the adhesive hardens and leaves a film that becomes acidic. Post-its are also unfriendly to newsprint (check the reverse side of the note and you will see that the type has been lifted off the newsprint). Removal of Post-its left for more than a month or two on brittle paper causes the paper to tear.

ACCESSING THE 1930-1990 CENSUS

A small branch of the Burear of the Census called AGE Search will, for \$25, search any two census records, 1930 - 1990, for your name or for that of a direct ancestor for whom you can provide proof of death, the search is limited to the person for whom you are requesting information, but you may ask for other members of the family to be included for \$2 for each additional person. You can also request a full line of information for an additional \$6. For the basic fee, the Census Bureau, if successful, will send you an official document giving you the person's name, age, place of birth, citizenship, and the name of the relationship to the head of the hoursehold. Form Bc-600, which is necessary to request a search, may be obtained at your local Social Security office or by writing Bureau of the Census, "Age Search", P.O. Box 1545, Jeffersonville, IN 47131. In the place on the form requesting the purpose of the search, family researchers should indicate "Genealogical Research".

CENTER FOR GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH PLANNED GREIFSWALD: POMERANIA

The descendents of German emigrants in all the world are increasingly interested in their ancestors and their origins. Especially in the USA, the trend "Back to the Fathers" is very strong; long journeys are not avoided in order to get closer to the origins of one's own family. Ancestor tourism and the "genealogy tours" could develop into an important commercial factor if it were possible to concentrate this kind of cultural and educational travel in one region.

The Augsburger sociologist and ethnologist Dr. Wolfgang Knabe, feels the city of Greifswald is especially well suited for this. He would like to devellop an Institute for Ancestor Research, professionally managed and privately financed. Greifswald offers advantages for such an undertaking; it is a University location where access to old archives and interdisciplinary collaboriation is possible; furthermore, Mecklenburg, Pomerania and Silesia were the starting point of a large emigration movement in the previous century. Approximately 400,000 fled hunger during that thime to the USA, Brazil, Australia and Scandinavia.

Construction of the institute planned by Dr. Knabe should begin as soon as next year. In spite of the high cost, one would like to manage without public means. The finances are to be undertaken by sponsors. Later the Institute will carry itself through the contributions of the ancestor searchers... In return, they will receive qualified information about the homeland of their grandfathers and mothers.

A further attraction for the tourist business could be a yet to be constructed museum of "Emigrant Experiences" in Greifsald. This museum could document the 500 year history of German emigrants and their cultural and commercial accomplishments in foreign lands.

KITH AND KIN BACK ONLINE!


