IN MEMORY OF LOUIS CHARLES HACKER

13 August 1942 - 20 March 1994

It is with great sadness that we inform our readers of the death of our dear friend, newsletter editor and past president, Louis Charles Hacker. To some of us he was "Dr. Hacker" and to the rest, he was simply "Lou". We all share in the loss of his expertise, advice and stories of his family... the witches in his closet, his relationship to "Princess Di", how he tied in with at least

two presidents of the United States, and so many more.

Lou was a dedicated genealogist. Whether it was during a work period at our June Dairy Days display at the Mall, a crash session to get a newsletter together, a board meeting with the Wisconsin Genealogical Council of which he was president or a problem solving session with the Computer Genealogy Interest Group of Central Wisconsin which he founded, Lou gave of his time and helped in whatever way he could. Even after his back surgery the latter part of January, Lou continued to put out the newsletter and was even a presenter at the group's Beginner's Workshop in February.

His presence will be missed not only by all of the local members which he worked so closely with, but also the many genealogists he touched in the surrounding groups of Wisconsin Rapids, Stevens Point, Wausau, and Merrill, as well as many other genealogists across the entire state of Wisconsin.


M.A.G.G. TENTH ANNIVERSARY POTLUCK

Cook County, Illinois Vital Records by Credit Card

You can now get birth, marriage and death records from Cook County Clerk, David Orr's office by using Mastercard or Visa credit cards. The service will allow a person to order records by calling 1-312-443-7538. A \$4.50 service fee will be added to the regular \$5.00 price for each copy of a certificate, along with the price of the postage. Callers can request either overnight or regular. The new service is run by Vital-Chek Network Services of Hermitage, TN, which has operated similar services in San Diego, New York and Los Angeles counties.

QUAKER RECORDS

If you discover a gravestone which reads "12th day of the First Month", this may be terminology used by a Quaker ancestor. The Quaker religion does not allow them to worship or speak of any pagan gods. Ten months of the calendar are named for pagan gods. Because Quakers could not use the actual month's name, they refer to the month as a number. If this number were to be changed to a month, you may loose the Quaker distinction.

CONFEDERATE PRISONERS

Relatives searching for cles to Civil War ancestors should be aware of the records of Confederate prisoners at Fort Delaware Prison on Pea Patch Island, Delaware. There are records for 2,436 Confederate soldiers who died in that prison during the Civil War. The prison held up to 12,595 inmates at a time and a total of 33,565 were held there during the war. The death rate at Fort Deaware was 12.5% compared to 9.5% at Andersonville, the military prison in Georgia where 13,000 Union soldiers died. Many people visit Fort Delaware to look for the signatures of their ancestors on the brick walls of the cells. When the prisoners died, their bodies were transported by boat to the New Jersey side of the Delaware River and buried in trenches at Inn's Point. The place is marked with a towering obelisk and at its base there are plaquues with names of the soldiers in the common grave.

COPYING FAMILY BIBLES

An excellent source of genealogical information is the family bible. If the bible is too large or too fragile to be photocopied, transcribe the information as follows:

- 1. The bible's title page and it's copywrite page.
 - 2. The genealogical information pages.
- 3. If you know the place of any event recorded, add date in 9).
- 4. Describe handwriting. If all is in the same hand and ink color, it could be
- copied and not written at the time of the event.
- 5. Include the name and address of the Bible's current owner.

DRAFT REGISTRATION CARDS

Draft registration cards relating to World War I are becoming available on microfilm through the LDS Library, but the full set covering three different registrations are not yet complete. Information on the cards, of men aged 18 to 45, both native born and alien, includes full name, full date and place of birth, race, citizenship, occupation, personal description, and signature. No information about military service is included. The collection is arranged by state, then county or city (except for Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island, which are arranged by divisions and counties), then alphabetically by names. Cards for men from the states of Alabama through North Carolina are available at the Family History Library, and others will be cataloged soon. To find microfilm numbers, search the locality section of the FHLC under United States/Military Records/World War/1914-1918. To obtain microfilm numbers for states not yet found in the catalog write to: Correspondence Unit, 35 North West Temple Street, Family History Library, Salt Lake City, Utah 84150. Some WWI service and burial records are also available from the FHL (see the same category listings of the locality section of the catalog). Official WWI military service records can be requested by the next of kin and others with stated needs, from: National Personnel Records Center, 9700 Page Boulevard, St. Louis, MO 63212-5100.

NEW YORK SHIPS LIST INDEX UPDATE

Precision Indexing, a commercial firm that publishes census indexes, is seeking more volunteers for its program in indexing 19th century New York ship passenger lists. A project manager has been engaged to oversee the work of hundreds of volunteers now being assigned microfilm. This corps of workers will extract the passenger information onto preprinted forms that will be returned for data entry into the computer database. The result will be a master index to the New York arrivals for the years 1820-1897. A soon to be released companion index is volume 1, 1820-1850, of the "Directory of Passenger Ships". This index will chronologically and alphabetically arrange ships that reached New York during these years. The information will include the captain's name, port and date of debarkation, and the highest three levels of nationality on board the ship. In 1984, the Marathon County Clerk of Court donated naturalization records for the period of 1852-1954 to the Sate Historical Society of Wisconsin. The Historical Society organized and inventoried the records and transferred them to the Area Research Center at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

The Marathon County Genealogical Society indexed the records for approximately 10,000 persons whose names appear among these documents.

Naturalization papers prior to 1906 provide only name, date and country of origin. Beginning with 1906, these records usually contain additional information including date and place of birth, place of last residence, the ship and the port of entry, residence after arrival, name of spouse and children.

Anyone doing early Marathon County research should use the naturalization papers. If you are unable to go to the ARC in person, please send your inquiry and an SASE to Mrs. Ruth Steffen, Librarian, ARC, UW-Stevens Point, Stevens Point, WI 54481. There is a minimal charge for copying.

If you wish to do the research in person, the hours of the ARC are 8:30-12:00, 1:00-4:30, Monday through Friday. These hours may vary during school vacation periods. Call Mr. William G. Paul, archivist at (715) 346-2586 to determine scheduled hours for the date of your planned trip. A listing of other counties' records that are also at the ARC follows in the next article.

The article includes information in five areas of genealogical research: what type of information you need to collect so staff can better collect family information for you; Census Records; Tithe applotment books and Primary Valuation; Wills and Administration; and Birth, Marriage, & Death Records.

The National Archives cannot carry out genealogical searches, but <u>Inside Ireland</u> can provide names and addresses of members of the Association of Professional Genealogists in Ireland who will carry out a search for a fee.

Information on lineages and patriots may be obtained from Registrar Generals Office, NSDAR, 1776 "D" Street N.W., Washington DC 20006. To request a copy of the application paper, enclose a check, made payable to

Treasurer General in the amount of \$3.00, patriot name, lineage number, and the name of the ancestor. If more than one application is on file, the lastest copy will be provided.

A word of caution: The DAR advises that the lineages appearing in the early DAR lineage books may contain some errors. In the early years of recording lineages, the DAR did not require actural proof of lineage or supporting documentation. Thus mistakes were recorded. Please use caution and only use these lineages as references.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION ON NEW GERMAN POSTAL CODES

There are now 26,000 - up from the previous 5,000. This new system of 5-digits became effective on 1 July 1993. Germany spent \$50 million advertising the system. The Immigrant Genealogical Society, P.O. Box 7369, Burbank, CA 91510-7369 is able to offer help in this regard. They have published a 44-page book, "1993 Updated Addresses to German Repositories." It lists the new codes for 1,224 German Archives and 333 German Genealogical & Historical Societies. Price: \$5.00 plus \$1.25 p/h. records. Births, deaths and marriages starting from 1864. Write: Joyce House, 8/11 Lombard Street East, Dublin, Ireland.

*The National Archives, Four Courts, Dublin 7, has census returns of 1901 and 1911 which list all persons living in Ireland in those years. All Wills admitted to probate since 1904 survive, and there are copies and abstracts of many 18th and 19th century Wills.
