

### RAILROAD PENSION RECORDS

These records are maintained by the Bureau of Retirement Claims and retained by them for five years after the death of the pensioner. They are then transferred to the National Archives that retains the records for 30 years After that time, these records are destroyed. They can contain a great deal of personal information about the individual receiving the pension and thus can be very valuable for family research.

It has been suggested that these records should either be preserved by the National Archives or that they be transferred to a research center that will maintain them. In addition, questionss are being raised about the criteria being used by the National Archives when decisions about destruction are being made. We need to contact our senators and congress people with our concerns about these issues.

In addition, the National Archives needs to be aware of the concerns that genealogists have over the access and retention of records.

# MILWAUKEE COUNTY RECORDS MICROFILMED

### FINDING ADOPTION RECORDS

IN RE means "in regard to something". That something for a genealogist just might be an adoption record. You can sometimes find adoptions listed in the county record books where divorce and probate records are filed. The courts are very clever and instead of putting adoptions under "A", they place them under "I".

In these records books, generally open to the public, they are indexed alphabetically. The first rule is never to say you are looking for an adoption, but rather say divorce or probate. Then turn to the "I" index and find "In Re". Under this category you fing In Re: Petition to Change Name, Petition to Adopt", etc.

### RESEARCH AT WISCONSIN DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES

On-site searching for vital records-general information:

\*Advance appointments are required. Since space is limited, an appointment must be made for each person in the group. Cancellations are allowed; "no shows" may be restricted from future searches. At present, they are booked for the next two months.

\*Hours for searching are 8:00 - 11:00 AM and 1:00 - 3:00 PM Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Tuesday and Thursday search hours are 1:00 - 3:00 PM. Hours may be altered if an emergency situation arises. No appointments will be made for the day after Thanksgiving and the week between Christmas and New Years.

\*Two persons are allowed in the search area at one time.

\*First time searchers or those persons needing considerable staff assistance are asked to identify that need at the time the appointment is made.

\*Children under 12 are not allowed in the search area. Children over 12 must have an appointment to enter the area.

\*At the time of registration, the searcher will be given a list of state regulations and office policies.

The searcher is expected to read and follow these rules. Failure to comply may result in loss of searching privileges.

\*Every searcher must register each day he/she enters the search area. The searcher must be prepared to show proper identification. Acceptable forms of identification are one of the following: drivers license, state ID, charge card or health insurance.card. Two of the following forms will also be acceptable: check, bank book, tyme card, bill with address, traffic ticket, library card, lease.

\*State Statutes specifically identify to whom certified copies of vital records may be issued. The searcher will be asked to state his/her relationship to the subject of the records when asking for a copy of the record.

#### SPECIFICS ABOUT RECORD ACCESS

\*Records not open to unassisted searches: Birth records 1940 to present; marriage records 1968 - present; divorce records 1968 to present.

\*Records not open to searches unless the searcher meets statutory criteria for receiving a certified copy of the record.; out-of -wedlock births; records sealed by court action.

\*Three assisted searches for free per appointment. Additional searches will be charged the fee for a certified/non certified copy of the record.
