#### **BUFFALO SOLDIERS**

The Ninth and Tenth Calvary and the 24th and 25th Infantry were regiments of the "Buffalo Soldier" formed after the Civil War. In 1994 a bronze statue of a black horseman was unveiled at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas in recognition of their military service in the West. Twelve of these soldiers had received a Medal of Honor.

The Cheyenne called them "Buffalo Soldiers" for they believed their hair resembled their sacred buffalo. The buffalo was the Indian's source of income besides being a cultural symbol. They believed the animal's strength and power could be transferred to them. Indian interpretation: the buffalo will face a storm head-on; so, you ought to be like him and face your problems and not run from them. The black soldiers were impressed and adopted the name.

# THE RAILROAD RETIREMENT BOARD

In 1937 a law was passed establishing the Railroad Retirement Board. The RR Board is located at 844 Rush St., Chicago, IL 60611, Phone (312) 751-4776. If your ancestor was a railroad worker in the 1930's or later, his records may be included here. Information can include months employed and earning record, father's name, all addresses, complete medical record, mother's maiden name, social security number, but not spouse's name.

# BROWN COUNTY REGISTER OF DEEDS HAS NEW ADDRESS

The new location of the Brown Register of Deeds is in the Northern Building at 305 East Walnut Street, Green Bay, WI. Records form before 1880 are in the archives at UWGB. The records from 1880-1990 are stored in a warehouse by a private company. In order to see these, you must find the volume and page number in the index at the courthouse. The probate personnel will have the record brought to the courthouse the following day where you can view it. Those from 1991 to present are at the probate office at the Brown County Court house.

## U.W. GREEN BAY - AREA RESEARCH CENTER INDEXES 1875 PLAT MAP

To make the index more complete, if only initials were used to designate the owner's name, the staff verified name with the 1875 tax rolls. The index also includes physical features such as creeks and railroad lines as well as the name of specific businesses, schools, cemeteries, etc. The index is arranged alphabetically. # THE MOST COMMON MISTAKES IN GENEALOGY

- \*Not using family group sheets and pedigree charts.
- \*Not contacting relatives for assistance.
- \*Assuming that "no one else is working on my line".
- \*Not using maps of the area at the time your ancestors lived there.
- \*Not knowing the history of the area in which you are researching.
- \*Not using common sense when reading other family histories. If sources for information are not listed, be cautious about accepting it. Some information may be hearsay.
- \*Gathering information on everyone by "that" surname, unless it is a very uncommon surname.
- \*Not using primary sources; Land probate, church, county records, but instead relying on printed histories.
- \*Not making photocopies.
- \*Not making a master copy. Leave the master copy at home when you travel to do research, and take the duplicate copy with you.
- \*Not organizing your records.
- \*Not paying attention to the clues your ancestors may have left.
- \*Assuming that your surname is 'never' spelled a different way.

#### MIRROR MAGIC

We have heard of a number of ways to read difficult tombstones, such as rubbing, wire brushes (a no-no), plastic net, Styrofoam, baking soda — and the latest one, shaving cream and a squeegee or sponge.

But we have discovered a method that we have never seen mentioned, which is simple, and has been a great help: a five or six inch bathroom mirror.

Experienced tombstone readers know that some difficult stones may be read when the sun "shadows" the fact at just the right angle. This usually occurs around 12:45 to 1:15 p.m. if the inscription faces west. It depends on the angle of the stone and the time of the year. With a mirror, you can do the same thing virtually any time of the day.

If you are working in the morning, with the sun shining on the back (east side) of the stone, a mirror can be used to reflect light on the west side. Even better, it can be reflected from the side to "shadow" the face of the stone. Moving the mirror to "shadow" from different angles should help in the reading. This has proven very helpful in reading small children's stones, and we have read many of them easily this way. This sometimes helps on old sandstones, too.

## **GERMAN NAME ENDINGS**

Recent surveys have shown that the ...ke German name endings, like Radtke, far outnumber other German name endings like ...ow and ...itz. This is not surprising since the ...ke name ending is an ancient one used by the Saxons from North Germany, around the Hamburg and Bremen area.

As these Plattdeutsch speaking Germans moved east through Mecklenberg, Pomeriania and East Prussia, they took their names there. Since the Baltic Sea area of Pomerania was heavily settled by Saxons, the ...ke ending was common in that area. As the Pomeranians later settled in Wisconsin and other states, these states also have many German names ending in ...ke.

#### RESEARCH IN GERMANY

Have you ever wondered how and where you could place a querey or an ad in a German genealogical magazine? Here's the place for you:

Familienkundliche Nachrichten is published six times a year and is devoted entirely to ads for "Missing Ancestors". It has a circulation of over 13,000 and is a very popular way for genealogists to publicize their queries.

Ads cost about \$15.00. The publishers prefer payment to be changed into the German currency of Deutsch Marks. Money can be changed at larger banks. Their next choices would be in American cash, or a check which should include an extra \$2.00 to cover the expense of changing the money.

The Familienkundliche Nachrichten is published on the first day of January, March, May, July, September, and November. Ads must arrive at the publisher at least six weeks prior to the date of publication.

A written narrative (in English) should detail all that you know about the German background of your family as well as the appropriate date your ancestor emigrated to America. A free copy of the publication will be mailed to you when your ad appears. The address of the publisher is:

### Accepted Standards of Conduct for Family History Researchers\*



- I will be courteous to research facility personnel.
- I will do my homework, and know what is available, and I will know what I want.
- I will dress appropriately for the records office that I am visiting.
- I will not take small children into repositories and research facilities.
- I will not approach the facility asking for "everything" on my ancestors.
- I will not expect the records custodian to listen to my family history.
- I will respect the records custodian's other daily tasks, and not expect constant or immediate attention.
- I will be courteous to other researchers and work with only a few records or books at a time.
- I will keep my voice low when conversing with others.
- I will use only designated areas for my workspace.
- I will not go into off-limits areas without permission.
- I will request permission before using photocopy and microforms machines, and ask for assistance if needed.
- I will treat records with care and respect.
- I will not mutilate, rearrange, or remove from its proper custodian any printed, original, microform, or electronic record.
- I will not force spines on books or handle roughly any original documents.
- I will not use my fingertip or a pencil to follow the line of print on original materials.
- I will not write on records or books.
- I will replace volumes in their proper location and return files to the appropriate places.
- I will not leave without thanking the records custodians for their courtesy in making the materials available.
- I will follow the rules of the records repository without protest.
