

Y2K READINESS

Many of us are wondering what the "Y2K" fuss is all about. It means "Year 2000," Some (usually older) computer chips cannot change data when the year 2000 is asked because they were programmed only with $\theta\theta$, which means 1900 to the machinery. You can do some basic checking for Y2K bugs in your own computer. It is very simple. First, make a back-up copy of everything on your PC!! Then just set your system clock to 11:59 for December 1999, and see what happens at midnight. For example, save a fake file and see how the system displays the last modified date. Check to see how your database or spreadsheet does a few calculations. This won't make every subtle problem become obvious, but it will let you know if you have some glaring Y2K hassles lurking. Finally, test your PC's ability to automatically roll over to the correct date when it's not in use. Set the clock to 23:58 p.m., December 31, 1999 and turn it off. Wait over two minutes, turn it back on and check the date.

A tiny diagnostic software utility may be downloaded free from the Web site of the National Software Testing Laboratories. The free YMARK2000 program can be downloaded from

The program temporarily sets the computer's internal clock to read 10 seconds before the millennium and then monitors its ability to roll over to 2000. It only checks your computer's hardware and BIOS, not the operating system nor any application programs.

Apple MacIntosh computers have always been ready for the Year 2000. Even the original Macs introduced in 1984 are fully compliant.

LAND POLICIES OF THE U.S.

Early land acts favored wealthy land speculators. Under the Land Ordinance of 1785, no one was allowed to buy less than one 640 acres section and the minimum price was \$1.00 per acre. Since few settlers could afford a whole section, most of the land was sold to companies which divided the land into smaller lots and sold them to individuals at a profit.

Before 1800, only a small minority settled directly on public domain land. In 1800 congress liberalized the land law so that a prospective farmer could buy 320 acres at \$2.00 an acre by paying \$160.00 down and liquidating the balance over a period of four or more years. Still, most frontiersman obtained their land from states or private speculators rather than from the federal government. The Land Ordinance of 1804 reduced the minimum purchases to 160 acres at \$2.00 an acre. The down payment was reduced to \$80.00 with the balance due over a period of four years.

The Land Act of 1820 further reduced the minimum acreage to be purchased and the cost: 80 acres at \$1.25 an acre in cash. The credit system was abolished. The first Pre-emption act was passed in 1830. This act allowed the settlers to occupy 160 acres and buy the land later at the minimum price. This act favored the west and aided the squatter by giving him first chance to buy the land he had cleared. The Land Act of 1841 continued the principle of pre-emption allowing any head of family to pre-empt land even before the government survey.

The Homestead Act of 1862 provided that a settler could acquire as much as 160 acres by living on it for five years, improving it and paying a fee of \$10.00. Pre-emption was still possible for certain squatters at \$.25 per acre.

TERMS USED IN LAND RECORDS

Abstract - A condensed history of the title to a piece of land. Appurtenance - An improvement belonging to the land, such as buildings, gardens, fences, etc.

Bounty Land Warrant - A right to obtain land, specific number of acres of unallocated public land, granted for military service.

Conveyance or Deed - A document by which title in real property is transferred from one party to another.

Dower - The right which a widow has in the real estate of her deceased husband.

Fee Simple - A estate which the owner is entitled to the entire property with power of disposition during his life and descending to his heirs upon his death intestate. (I.e. the owner can sell it, mortgage it, give it away, etc. and if he dies without a will, it goes to his heirs as determined by local law). Measurements -

Acre - 43,560 square feet or 160 square rods.

Chain - 66 feet.

Furlong - 660 feet.

Link - 7.92 inches.

Perch, Pole, or Rod - 16 1/2 feet.

Section - 640 acres or one square mile.

Arpent - A land measure of French origin equal to 100 square rods where the rod is 18 feet long. In 183 Missouri, an arpent equaled .8 acre.

Hectare - approximately 100 acres.

League - A Spanish measure used in Texas and California; a square league equaled about 4430 acres.

Vara - A Spanish linear land measurement equal to 31-34 inches.

Lease - An agreement which creates a landlord-tenant situation.

Lien - A claim by one party upon the property of another for security in payment of debt.

Metes and Bounds - A system of land description which used trees, rocks, water courses and other markers to identify land. Moiety - Half of anything.

Mortgage - A conditional transfer of title to real property as security in payment of debt.

Power of Attorney - A person, unable to act for himself, appoints another to act in his behalf.

Quitclaim - A deed in which a person releases all claim he may possess in real property. It does not guarantee that the seller was the sole owner.

RECTANGULAR SURVEY SYSTEM

Range, Township, Section, Part of Section and the original land survey name have become the basic legal description for most of the land originally surveyed by the United States Government in the 29 public land states.

The Land Ordinance of 1785 established the rectangular survey to subdivide public lands. It provided that the western territory be divided into surveying townships of 6 miles square. Each township would contain 36 sections, each 1 mile square and containing 640 acres. Townships were numbered from a base south to north in rows called ranges. The ranges were numbered from east to west.

At first sections were numbered 1 to 36 beginning in the southeast corner of the township and running from south to north in each tier to number 36 in the northwest corner of the township. By act of congress, the numbering system was changed in May of 1796. The act proved that "the sections shall be numbered, respectively, beginning with the number one in the northeast section, and proceeding west and east alternately through the township, with progressive numbers, till the thirty-sixth be completed" in the southeast corner of the township.

Section 16 in each township was reserved for the maintenance of schools and sections 8, 11,26 and 29 were reserved for future sale or disposition by Congress.

The first public lands to be surveyed in the U.S. were the "Seven Ranges" located in Eastern Ohio. On September 30, 1785, Thomas Hutchins, Geographer of the United States, began to survey the Geographer's Line. The point of beginning was the intersection of the Pennsylvania State line and the Ohio River. The line eventually ran 42 miles (seven ranges) due West. Townships in the Seven Ranges are numbered as prescribed in the Land Ordinance of 1785. The only other surveys which used this same section arrangement are the "Between the Miami Rivers Survey. both in southwestern Ohio.

The problem of keeping townships 6 miles square, the the earth is curved, was solved by Jared Mansfield in 1804. Mansfield, the Surveyor General of the Northwest Territory, established an arbitrary meridian and an intersection eastwest baseline to survey the 2nd Principle Meridian in southern Indiana. Ranges of townships were progressively numbered eastward and westward from the meridian, while townships within each range were numbered northward and southward from the base line. Thew outermost sections of the outermost ranges were less than the specified 640 acred to account for the curve of the earth. There are 34 pinciple meridians in the United States, some designated by number and most by names.


