# MARSHFIELD TAVERN QUILT SURFACES

The following article appeared on a posting of the Wood County message board of RootsWeb.Com within the past few weeks:

Carol is the owner of a tavern Quilt (or autograph quilt). She would like to date it using the "autographs" on the blocks. There are 20 autographs (some repeats) to a block and there are 5 blocks to a row. There are 6 rows. A few of the names are familiar. It appears that most of the signatures are folks from Marshfield, WI and near surrounding areas. [A list of the signatures appear on pages 6, 7 & 8 of this newsletter.]

Carol is trying to date the quilt and find out the quilt history. You can contact her at Cjohn@tznet.com. Here are the clues so far:

When Carol's mother-in-law, Marie (nee WILSON) JOHNSON passed away in 1981, the quilt was found in a trunk. One name, which was recognized immediately, was her mother, Mrs. August (Anna) (nee NEU-MANN) WEISTER b 18 Aug 1883 d 20 Oct 1944.

Denny NELSON (local historical society) thought it sounded like a "tavern quilt". He explained that on a Tavern quilt, folks for a quarter or so, would have their name stitched on a block. Then, the quilt would be raffled off.

The next clue was from Carol's husband who said some of his WEISTER uncles may have operated a tavern in Marshfield. This line of query has not as yet been researched.

# MEMOIRS, OUR PEOPLE...THE INDIANS

**Book Review** 

This is the title of one of the books available in the Frank P. Zeidler Humanities Room in the Milwaukee Public Library, (929.371 M376). Published in 1950, by Mary (McGuire) Martell for a few close friends and family, it is the first genealogical document that established Indian and French-Canadian heritages, 1750-1950, in the Upper Mississippi region of the United States. Though Mary lived in Dubuque, Iowa until her death in 1986, historically her husband's people had lived in the areas of Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin, Harpers Ferry, Iowa and Pembina-Red River of the North in North Dakota and Minnesota. Driven by her genealogical interest, she spent many years studying official documents and traveling over the lands that her husband's people once owned in order to speak to aged Indians about family relationships in an effort to establish her husband's family tree.

Mary Martell's research resulted in a book that includes the stories she heard and the relationships and familial connections between Indians and French-Canadians through marriages with over fifty surnames represented. Any genealogist, whose research includes one or more of these surnames, would certainly want to review this book.

More recently, MCGS member, Lynn Candace Harper of Milwaukee and Richard McQuisten of Laramie, Wyoming, have taken the original genealogical information available in this *Memoirs* and updated and extended the Martel/Martelle and allied family lines. This project has resulted in a more comprehensive hard-bound, three-volume series that is near publication.

Consider becoming a member of the society that is most meaningful to your research.

The site has the ship's passenger list from the 1620 voyage, with some biographical and genealogical I nformation for each passenger. The site also includes documents concerning the ship itself; some wills and estate inventories of the original Pilgrims; full test of some Pilgrim writings; historical documenta ries; genealogical and social resources; links to museums and archives containing information about the Plymouth Colony; as well as a list of professional researchers to hire.

Free DAR Patriot Lookup Service— The Daughter of the American Revolution records are among the most valuable genealogical resources available. The DAR Patriot Index contains names of Revolutionary patriots, both men and women, whose service (between 1775 and 1783) has been established by the National DAR Society. Information available may include: dates and places of birth and death, name (s) of wife/wives or husband(s), rank, type of service, and the state where the patriot lived or served. If pension papers are known to exist, that fact will be included. If you are interested in knowing if your ancestor is recognized by the DAR as a Revolutionary Patriot, find out at:

# WISCONSIN CIVIL WAR RECORDS

Once you've found your soldier in the Roster of Wisconsin Volunteers order a photocopy of your Wisconsin ancestor's Civil War service record. For most soldiers, these records show soldier name, rank, age and birthplace, hair and eye color, complexion, height, occupation and residence, when, where, and by whom enlisted; term of service; place where enlistment was credited; and date and manner of termination of service. A special "remarks" section lists promotions, special duties, leaves of absence engagements, injuries and if the soldier died in service, date and place of death and sometimes place of burial.

# DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

The website features records collections that cover all periods of American history, not just the Revolutionary War. You can use the Web site to tap into your military roots and more thanks to a new resource. The Genealogical Records Committee National Index allows you to search for unpublished genealogical materials, including many Bible and cemetery transcriptions. These and other resources are part of the nearly 18,000 volumes of typescripts the DAR Library has indexed. Currently, most of the volumes have been compiled and are available online for Virginia, Maryland, Oregon and Kentucky. Records for about 20 other state will be added to the Web site as they're compiled.

To search the index, click on DAR Library at the top of the home page. Once you've entered the library's page, click on GRC National Index. In the search field, you'll enter the state, surname, first name, series and volume number. You can sort results by one of those categories. If you need help getting started, click on INFO for Beginners in the left column of the search page.

# MAINTAIN FAMILY'S LEGACY USING CAREFUL TECHNIQUES

Here's some advice from professional curators for preserving family keepsakes for generations to come:

- Paper (Marriage certificates, award certificates, diplomas, love letters, newspaper clippings, etc.):
  - -Don't place them where the sun crosses their path. -Don't leave them in musty basements. -Don't hang them near water pipes.
  - -Don't store them in attics or garages. -Don't leave them folded.
  - -Don't repair them with glue or Scotch tape. (Causes stains.)
  - -Don't keep them in a letter envelope. (Causes crisscross stains.)
  - -Don't mark them with ball-point pens or felt-tip markers. (Causes bleed-through stains.
  - -Mount them in a frame with acid-free matteboards and glass that filters ultra-violet light.
  - -Photocopy them on archival-quality paper and display the copies. De-acidify the originals and store them in plastic sleeves.
  - -Encapsulate fragile materials.
  - -Be sure to use PVC-free plastics like Mylar, Melinex or Estar. Plastics containing PVC (polyvinyl chloride) break down into hydrochloric acid.
- Books (Family Bibles, scrapbooks, diaries, journals, etc.):
  - -Don't place original wedding and birth announcements and death notices in the family Bible. -Don't mount items on traditional black album paper. It's highly acidic.
  - -Photocopy newspaper clippings on archival-quality paper, and place them in the family Bible or scrap book.
  - -Remount items on acid-free paper.
  - -Interleaf books with acid-free tissue paper.

#### Photographs:

- -Don't mount photos in magnetic photo albums.
- -Don't drymount photos. Adhesives can bleed through. -Don't throw away negatives.
- -Store photos, slides and negatives in PVC-free plastic sleeves.
- -Take black-and-white photographs of important events. Black-and-white photographs will last in definitely. Color degrades over time.
- Artwork and antiques (Paintings, sculpture, pottery, metal objects, wooden objects, furniture, etc.):
  - -Don't place artwork above a fireplace.
  - -Don't place artwork-especially watercolor paintings-inside a bathroom.
  - -Don't place wooden objects-especially furniture or musical instruments from a more humid climate on or near registers and radiators.
  - -Don't expose artwork-especially pottery and pewter-to winter temperatures.
  - -Don't handle artwork with unwashed hands. The salts and oils in perspiration are especially hazardous to metals, which can be permanently marred.
  - -Don't pick up artwork at its weakest point (i.e.-handle of an antique teapot that might have broken off and been glued back on).
  - -Don't store silver in plastic wrap or boxes lined with felt. Both contain sulfur, the primary cause of tarnishing.
  - -Don't overpolish metals. Each polishing removes a layer of metal.
  - -Don't attempt to clean most artwork and antiques. Once a chemical gets into a porous material, it's there for keeps.
  - -Maintain a relative humidity of 35% to 40 % and a temperature of 65 to 70 degrees.
  - -Wash hands or, better yet, put on acid-free gloves prior to handling.
  - -Store silver with sulfur-absorbent cloth.


