THE HOW TO COLUMN

A Checklist for Deed Research

There are three ways you can conduct deed research.

- 1. Research in person at the courthouse. The best way is to travel to the county courthouse and read the deed books yourself. But the next best way is to find a person familiar with that county's records who can do the research for you. Try contacting a local genealogical society to see if there is a person who can visit the courthouse of your behalf.
- 2. Research by mail. A county's register of deeds of deed records may look in a deed index for you if your request is concise and to the point. Write the keeper of deeds and ask them to the Grantor/Grantee Index for evidence of ancestor's name during a period of about twenty years, emclosing a Self-Addressed Stamped Emvelope(SASE)
- 3. Research microfilm copies of the deeds. After checking online at www.familysearch.org for evidence of microfilmed deed indexes, the same site will tell you where the nearest Family History Center is located and where microfilm can be ordered and used on interlibrary loan from the FHL in Salt Lake City.


