The funeral of Mrs. Henry Doll last Friday morning from St. John's Catholic church was largely attended. Mrs. Thomas Stockell, of Victor, Colo., and Mrs. Frank, of St. Lawrence, this state, daughters of the deceased, were here to attend the funeral. Other relatives who were called here by the death of Mrs. Doll were: Joseph Kaiser, of Fond du Lac; Gerhard Wininger, Gundrum, Peter Hederer and Miss Gertrude Strupp, all of Allenton and Jos. Frank, of St. Lawrence, Washington county.

Mrs. Gertrude Doll, an aged and respected citizen of this place, died at her home in the 3rd ward at 11:30 on Monday night of this week. She was the wife of Henry Doll, who yet survives he. Deceased was born in Prussia in the year 1820 and was, therefore, not quite 79 years of age. For a woman so advanced in years, she was exceedingly robust and scarcely ever knew what it was to be sick, the ultimate cause of her death being pneumonias. he was the mother of five children, Fred Doll and Mrs. Mike Steinmetz of this city, Mrs. Herman Bloomer of the town of Marshfield, Mrs. Jos. Frank of Washington Co., this state and Mrs. Lessie Stockell of Victor, Colorado. The funeral takes place at 10:00 a.m. today.

Death of Henry Doll

Henry Doll, one of the pioneers of Marshfield, died Wednesday evening at the home of Herman Bloomer east of town while on a visit. The funeral will take place at 9 o'clock Saturday morning from St. John's Catholic church. Mr. Doll was eighty-three years of age and has been a resident of this city since 1881. He leaves one son, Fred Doll.

Funeral of Henry Doll

The funeral of the late Henry Doll was held on Friday last from St. John's Catholic church, Rev. J. Eisen officiating. Deceased was born near Duren, in Germany, in 1819 and was therefore 83 years of age. He came to this country more than half a century ago and has lived in Marshfield for the past twenty-one years. He is survived by one son, Fred Doll, and four daughters, Mrs. Michael Steinmetz and Mrs. Herman Bloomer, of this city, Mrs. Jos. Frank of Addison, Washington county, and Mrs. Lizzie Stockell of Colorado. Mr. Doll died on Wednesday night about 10:00 p.m. at the home of Mrs. Bloomer where he had been visiting. He had suffered from heart trouble for a number of years and several times was not expected to live from hour to hour. He was held in high respect by all who knew him.
