
Eagle House—134 South Central Avenue

The eagle Hotel has fourteen guest rooms, all of them up-to-date in every respect, steamheated, with electric lights, and the service is first-class in all respects.

The house is conducted on the American plan, rates being \$1.50 per day, and the service, including the dining room, is on a par with many of the hotels of the large cities.
