LEAP YEAR

The rule for leap years is that every four years an extra day can be added in February except for this special case; every year that marks a century is NOT a leap year unless it is divisible by 400. The year 2000 will be leap year but we will have to wait until the year 2400 before another century marker year adds a 29th day to February. The century marker years of 1900 and 1800, although divisible by 4, are not evenly divisible by 400; therefore the extra day in February was not added in those years.

NARA – GREAT LAKES REGION RESUMES TUESDAY EVENING HOURS

Archives and Records The National Administration - Great Lakes Region has announced the resumption of Tuesday evening research hours beginning Tuesday, October 3, 2000. Tuesday evening Microfilm Reading Room hours will extend from 4:30 p.m. until 8:30 p.m. This resumption of public research time beyond regular business hours is possible because significant Archives staffing reductions in late December 1998 have since been restored. Several new Archives personnel have been trained in basic family history research sources and techniques during the past year.

This extension of research hours on Tuesday evenings currently applies solely to the Archives' Microfilm Reading Room. Reservations are strongly recommended. Space is limited, and persons arriving unexpectedly without prior reservations cannot be guaranteed the use of a microfilm reader. Make your reservations early by telephoning the Microfilm Reading Room at (773) 581-7816, extension 138, between 8 a.m. and 4:15 p.m. Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, or between 8 a.m. and 8:30 p.m. Tuesday. Please note that, in accordance with National Archives Reading Room rules nationwide, researchers in the Microfilm Reading Room on Tuesday evenings may be asked to return their microfilm rolls and other research materials to their proper locations 15 minutes before closing.

MOURNING JEWELRY

Mourning jewelry was common in the 18th and 19th centuries. During the revolution when the colonists felt the economic strain of war, jewelry of this type was frowned upon. Long after the traditional mourning period had ended, jewelry could be worn in memory of the dead. Men and women wore large beautiful gold lockets sometimes decorated with tiny black and white They contained figures mourning pictures. weeping over tombs beneath willow trees or Sometimes the locket looked like the birches. person who had died. It could be watercolor on paper or on ivory. Having something that reminds one of the deceased preserves a feeling of connection and closeness that transcends death and to help accept the loss.

OBITUARY CODING

Everyone has felt the frustrations of finding an old obituary only to discover that the helpful person who clipped the article neglected to include the date and name of the newspaper. Assist future generations with this problem by encouraging your local newspaper to begin using obituary coding.

Publisher's Genealogical Coding System (PGCS), created and owned by David W. Dole, is a coding system for obituaries. For a minimum one-time charge, newspapers and other publications, which publish, obituaries are issued a license for a 7-character identifying code. This code plus 8 additional characters in standard format complete the 15 character PGCS code which is published with each obituary.

Example: PGCS code A10056N2000JA05

A Published in the United States
10056 Name of publication (Daily Tribune)

N Circulation & frequency of publication
2000JA05 Publication date of January 5, 2000

Among the organization supporting the PGCS code are the Association of Professional Genealogists, Council of Genealogy Columnists, Federation of Genealogical Societies, and the National Genealogical Society.

AN IDEA

Citizenship is Granted to 32 in Marathon County

Admission to citizenship is not only a privilege but carries with it definite duties and obligations, Judge Gerald J. Boileau warned 32 newly created citizens in circuit court Friday afternoon in a final citizenship hearing for the largest group in several years.

The Judge called attention to the sacrifices now being made by Americans in all parts of the world to protect the rights that had just been conferred upon the former residents of foreign nations. He emphasized that loyalty to the country and its traditions was a requirement of good citizenship.

Eighteen former citizens of Germany, one from Austria and three from Hungary were included among the new citizens following their giving proof of loyalty despite the fact their nations are at war with the United States. Six were former citizens of Poland, two from the Netherlands and one each from Russia and Switzerland.

The new citizens and the country of their former allegiances are:

Germany: Jacob H. Hoffman, Marathon County Home and Hospital; Philipine Shadof, Milwaukee; Mary Regall, Colby route 1; Margaret Dehnel, Wausau; John M. Thomsen, town of Emmet; John P.
