
### Vollmar & Voelker Co.

A special edition of any Marshfield publication would be imperfect indeed if it did not contain a history of the firm and establishment which since 1880 have been so firmly a part and parcel of it, and have added to much of its own growth and progress as the Vollmar and Voelker Co. Mr. F. Vollmar the senior member of the house, established the business in 1880, he being one of Marshfield's pioneer merchants. The company was incorporated in 1891, Mr. J. L Voelker having acquired an interest in the business since that date. There is not a business in the city that could possibly be as well known in or out of it, as no house of whatever line are so thoroughly caterers to the general wants of the people. The family of smallest means as well as those of most exquisite desires can send or come to establishment and find just exactly what they need. In dress goods, silks, clothing, cloaks, suits, shoes, curtains, draperies, general dry and fancy goods, groceries, crockery, including high art decorative ware.

Their business is done both in a wholesale and retail way and in both branches do they excel. They are situated at Nos. 213 and 215 Central Avenues, occupying a substantial two-story and basement brick building 44x75 feet in dimension. The company also have a large warehouse in the rear of the business premises. Both interior and exterior of this establishment makes one forget the bustling, busy city of more than sic thousand inhabitants, and we imagine that some old eastern city has had the establishment plucked from its center and set up in our city ready made. The perfect system throughout includes all the attest improvements—elevated railroads with balls for cash, elevated stations, etc. In conversation we tried to learn the round numbers of last years' business throughout this immense establishment but were informed that the figures being so high they would appear fabulous. Marshfield: Member of the firm of Dorschel & Co., general merchandise, came to Marshfield from Chilton, Wis., and commenced business here, October 25, 1880. He was born in Waterloo County, Canada, March 11, 1857. He is a son of Peter and Catherine (Kumpf) Vollmar, who came from the Phine Provinces to Canada. They still live in Canada. He came to "the states", July 6, 1876 and was in the employ of Mr. Dorschel of Chilton, as clerk for a while; afterward became a member of the firm of Dorschel & Co. (from the 1881 History of Northern Wisconsin)
